the use of barbiturates, 7.6 percent, and solvent-sniffing, 9.7 percent, while the use of glue was higher than in Toronto but lower than Niagara Falls.

"The students' social background, as determined by the father's occupation, was an important factor in differentiating drug users from non-users.

"In both Toronto and the Niagara counties, illicit drug users were over-represented among students whose fathers were professionals and under-represented among students whose fathers held semi-skilled positions.

In Haldimand County, "the pattern was much the same - children of farmers... tend to be low in drug use."

Receives Federal Funds

OTTAWA - Citizens of Sudbury, Ont., will benefit from a \$20,000 grant to Laurentian University from the federal government's Opportunities for Youth program.

The grant, announced Friday by Secretary of State, Gerard Pelletier, will enable students at Laurentian's School of Social Work and other faculties to make a survey and detailed study of the needs and resources of the Sudbury community.

Using questionnaires and interviews, the students will attempt to discover the major concerns and problems of Sudbury residents as well as possible means of handling these needs.

At the conclusion of the project, they will present a report which they hope will enhance community awareness of the gaps in community services. The report will be made available to social service agencies, community services, volunteer service groups and all levels of government as well as to Laurentian University.

population, composed mainly of factory workers, economically underprivileged and student youth, are facing a crisis as home-owners sell their property to large and powerful planned development institutions.

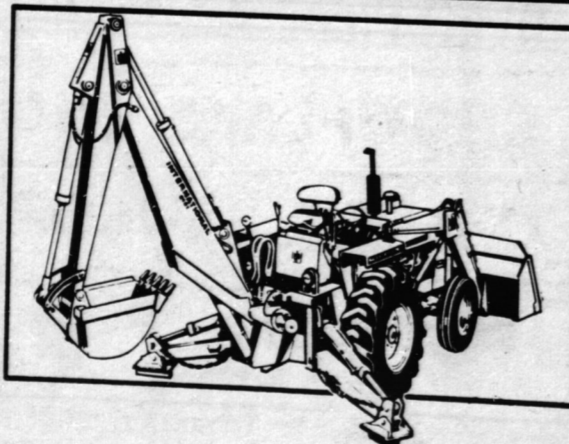
The students participating in this project hope to consolidate these tenants of the Spadina communities, working with already existing groups such as the Company of Young Canadians, the University Settlement House, and local residents' associations. They will use video tapings as an organizational tool to create dialogue between the English-speaking and immigrant residents and to demonstrate to these people tactics, objectives, and ideas

of landlord-tenant relations and tenant rights.

The group will also survey the Grange Park area, researching attitudes toward redevelopment and relocation, and data on whether the houses in the area are owned by residents, non-residents landlords, or developers. It is hoped that this data will also serve as the basis for an information centre, to educate the citizens about the options and sales sought by developers in their neighborhoods.

This Opportunities for Youth project is designed to increase the ability of residents of Spadina to express themselves as a community and to gain more control over their own environment.

On The Farm Front

Now is the time to check alfalfa fields every few days (about twice each week) for alfalfa weevil. There is evidence now that eggs have already been laid in the alfalfa stems. With warm weather these could soon hatch into larvae (the small green worms) that do most of the feeding damage.

Growth in the alfalfa was slow this spring so there is no guarantee that we will be able to get the alfalfa cut soon enough for hay or silage to avoid serious damage.

For the sake of the alfalfa plant, cutting should not be done until just before the first bloom. During the last two years the first bloom occurred near the end of May and possible to cut at that time for hay or for haylage.

If there is a choice, haylage will get the crop off the field faster. If the weather is dry enough, then this leaves the weevil either in the silo or on the ground exposed to the sun. If all goes well, the weevil will be killed by the sun before second growth is damaged.

This system doesn't always work, but damage to the second cut alfalfa has not been too bad in the last two years.

If all of the above fails and conditions are such that you have to spray, the insecticides that can be used are Malathion, Carbaryl (Sevin), Methoxychlor or Furadan. Be sure to check the directions. Remember that spray materials can kill bees too! **

A mail ballot will be conducted soon on an egg and fowl marketing plan. Ballots will be forwarded to producers who have registered with their marketing board. Those with over 500 hens should register if they have not done so yet. This would then make them eligible for a ballot and, if the vote carries, for allocation of a quota. Producers with less than 500 hens are not required to register.

The Egg and Fowl Board is endeavouring, through the proposed changes, to provide a more adequate supply of eggs to the market and to obtain a realistic price for the product to the producers. **
