

Track Records Broken

Sixteen track records were broken last week at the Southern Ontario Secondary Schools Association Zone Two track and field meet held at Hagersville Secondary School.

There were 12 competing schools, but again the two main powers of last year, Hagersville and Dunnville staged a great battle.

These two schools left most of the others far behind in over-all points. Hagersville won the entire meet with 245 points, with Dunnville a total of 238½ points.

Those students from Hagersville who broke previous records were Wayne Johnson in the Javelin event, with a throw of 153 feet, 8¼ inches. The previous mark was 152 feet, 4 inches and had stood since 1967.

Roger Spies travelled 42 feet 6¼ inches for a new triple jump record. Joyce Barr set a new mark in the senior shot put, tossing it 38 feet, five inches.



Another Youth Movement

Between 3,500 and 4,000 urban young people will visit Ontario farms throughout the summer for periods of one week each. This exchange program developed by the Ontario Government Inter-departmental Committee on Youth, is being activated through the Extension and Home Economics Branches of the Ontario Department of

Agriculture and Food. In Haldimand and Wentworth Counties, we are expecting to place 200 selected urban students from the city of Hamilton. The main objective of the program is to provide a learning experience for urban and rural youth, ages 12-15.

To ensure the success of this program, we will need the co-operation of rural

farm families to act as hosts for the urban youth. The responsibility of the host farm family will be to include the urban young person in the farm life so that he or she will receive a serious insight into the business of farming. We feel the program is an ideal opportunity for Ontario farmers to make the fellow urbanites aware of the present agricultural

situation in 1971. Success of this program greatly helps to improve the image of farmers as well as urban youth and parents.
