

## Man Hurt In Collision

SIMCOE - A St. Williams man was injured in a three-vehicle pile-up Monday on Highway 3 at the Nixon Sideroad west of here.

Eldin Pye, 43, of St. Williams, received minor injuries in the crash and was treated and released from Norfolk General Hospital. Pye was the driver of a Howe Brothers stake-truck in the crash, which received \$300 damage. Also involved in the crash were Bryan Zilkey, 31, of 154 Colbourne St. N., Simcoe, the driver of a car and Lloyd Milmine, 29, of R.R. 5 Waterford, driver of a tractor-trailer owned by Laurie's Iron and Metal, R.R. 2 Hagersville. Damage to the tractor-trailer was \$2,500 and to the car, \$75.

Police said a Union Gas line was ruptured in the mishap and damage to the line was set at \$25. Simcoe Fire Department and Union

Gas vehicles were at the scene in the event of fire. Police also reported a minor accident occurred while traffic was stopped and the vehicles were being pulled from the ditch. Const. Wayne Elliot, Simcoe OPP investigated.

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nutrient treatment areas be built.

The areas to be serviced are Woodhouse Acres, on Highway 6, Brant Hill, Ryerse Crescent, Prospect Hill and Lynn Park to the west of Port Dover.

He said the \$1,500 survey, already accepted by the Ontario Municipal Board for Port Dover, needs to be incorporated into the department's engineering survey.

Mr. Cockburn said a 51 per cent subsidy on new construction would be paid by the Ontario government, as services would be available to two municipalities. He further proposed that all design, construction and costs would be the responsibility of the OWRC, which would own and maintain the services.

At present, more than 95 per cent of provincial sewer systems are under OWRC control.

Reeve Pow said the township had been seeking a meeting with Port Dover and the OWRC. The three subdivisions, he said, want and need services beyond the supply of water. However, at present, a town bylaw prohibits servicing of areas outside the municipal boundaries.

Mr. Cockburn said the local PUC would be hired to handle the upkeep of the system. The municipalities would share in the total cost of planning and treatment development.

Mayor John Irving, of Port Dover, also agreed his council would give immediate consideration to the proposal.

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has had the effect of giving us the time of finding the most economical way to develop the Lake Erie project.

"It definitely hasn't been ruled out, just the timing has been changed. Now we are considering how best to develop the project.

"The United States steel industry has overexpanded as well as Japan. This is a critical economic fact of life and we are learning by their failures. We now intend to grow in smaller steps, with the same ultimate goals in view.

"We can better control our capital expenditures by drawing on new technology. The old ways of making steel required enormous expenditures with huge blast furnaces. Now technology is on the point of a breakthrough in the steel making industry.

"Good planning is also essential and we can't develop without this type of control.

"Once we get our go ahead, then the area can't help but go ahead. It's a matter of timing. We have been rounding out our Hilton works, but it won't

meet our customers' eventual requirements and then we must go ahead with the Lake Erie development."

Mr. Fisher also confirmed that Mr. Richardson's comment that Stelco could begin development by 1973 was substantially correct.
