November is annual meeting and convention time at county and provincial levels. This seems an appropriate time to assess what has been accomplished as a result of the last annual meeting and convention.

The federation convention is a meeting of farmers from across the province to draft federation policies for the coming year. This is accomplished by resolutions from all over the province for consideration by the delegates who are assembled. Some resolutions carried at the last meeting which benefit our area are as follows:

A request for a reduction in crop insurance premiums to make the insurance program more attractive.

Adjustments in the capital grants program in order that the full amount available per person could be applied to one project.

A grant for the removal of unsightly elm trees.

A special rate to be introduced for farm truck licenses.

These O.F.A. policies have been incorporated into the Ontario government's agriculture programs.

The resolution asking for special benefits for individual service members of O.F.A. was carried, the results being a preferred customer rate achieved with Goodyear stores.

The past year has been filled with activity and solid achievements to create an

effective voice for farmers. What will be our goals in the year ahead?

Many matters are still crying for attention. Problems of pollution, pesticides and the disposal of animal waste are still with us. The government has not accepted the principal of education tax on the ability to pay policy. We do not have any effective national marketing legislation as yet.

It is the responsibility of the delegates to the the O.F.A. convention to be as responsible as possible and as militant as necessary in dealing with the problems facing the agriculture industry today.

CHEAPSIDE - School days were over for this year at the Wilson MacDonald Memorial School Museum, as the doors closed Oct. 17, with 13 present.

Of worthy mention on the last day were the Evans twins who were pupils of S.S. No. 2 McGaws in the 1890's, and whose pictures on the "who's who" list shows these two boys with their teacher Russell Coleman in the year 1898. Late comers on Oct. 30, were Hamiltonians Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Long whose picture is also shown in the 1915 group. Elmer's boyhood home was in the Cheapside community.

Throughout the season there were registered 1,111 names of guests who had visited the school. Of those who have enjoyed the picnic tables and grounds there is no record but often in passing by there were those who enjoyed the quiet cool of the countryside museum park tables or just a period of relaxation.

Among the guests were 12 Women's Institutes and Church picnic groups, one bus load of high schoolers from Niagara, one group from Queen Victoria School, Hamilton; Walpole North School, grade 3 and 4 with their teachers and principal; a group of teenage boys from Hagersville Sprucedale School with their principal, and various groups who came by appointment during week days.
