

Guiding Leaders Attend Training

Some 400 leaders and commissioners of the Girl Guides of Canada of Niagara Area recently attended a training day held at the Grimsby High School. This is an annual event, with training offered to Brownie, Guide and Ranger leaders as well as Commissioners.

Mrs. Shirley Gibbons, a trainer from Hamilton who has returned from Europe training leaders with Packs and Companies with the Canadian Armed Forces Overseas, opened the day with a talk on the Promise and Law. This is the basis of the Scouting and Guiding movements.

Mrs. Gibbons voted it is the responsibility of the leader to weave the Promise and Law into the girls' total

program within the framework of fun, adventure and fellowship. The challenge to a leader is to be an example to her girls by actually living the Promise and Law.

PESTICIDE REVIEW

The Canada Department of Agriculture is expanding its pesticide review program. The purpose of the program, which is carried out by the Control Products Section under the Pest Control Products Act, is to re-evaluate all pesticides in the light of current criteria and data, and to provide for the orderly modification of pesticide uses in Canada. Twenty-one compounds were reviewed in 1970-71; about 20 are scheduled for review in 1972.

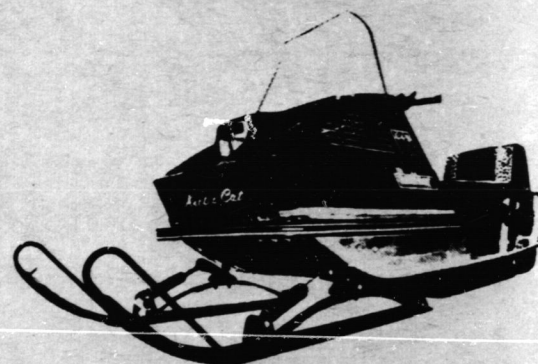

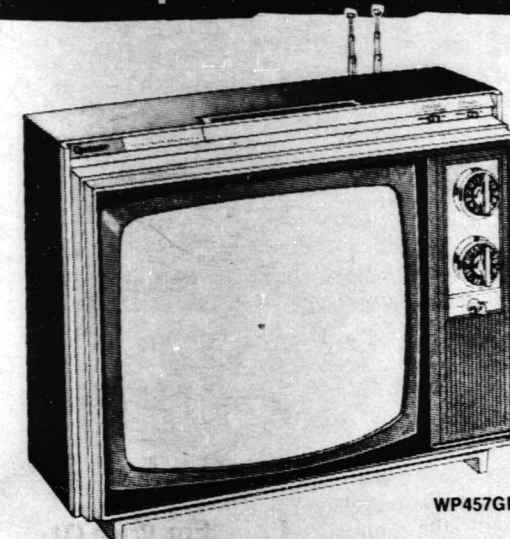
Mrs. Lionel Ford gave a review of the Area Convention. Members were reminded of the Card Party at North Walpole School on Nov. 19.

Mrs. W. North gave the courtesy remarks.

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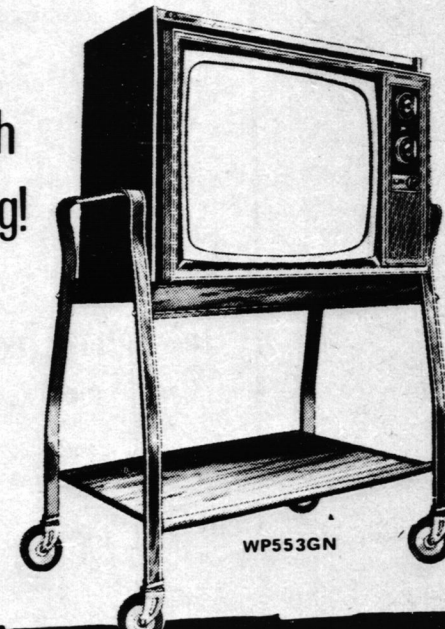
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
