May Curtail Spring Hiring

CAYUGA - Proposals that would curtail the hiring of teachers this spring are being viewed cautiously by Halton County education officials and teachers.

An Ontario School Trustees' Council bid to the mass hiring in Toronto each spring was agreed to by the Haldimand board of education. The move would be advertising for vacant positions as early as the week in January. Hiring would be done at the schools.

Until this year, advertising did not begin until March or April and hiring sessions were held at all boards in the Royal York Hotel.

E. A. Smith, superintendent of education, says the success of the new practice would depend on how soon staff could work out staff needs.

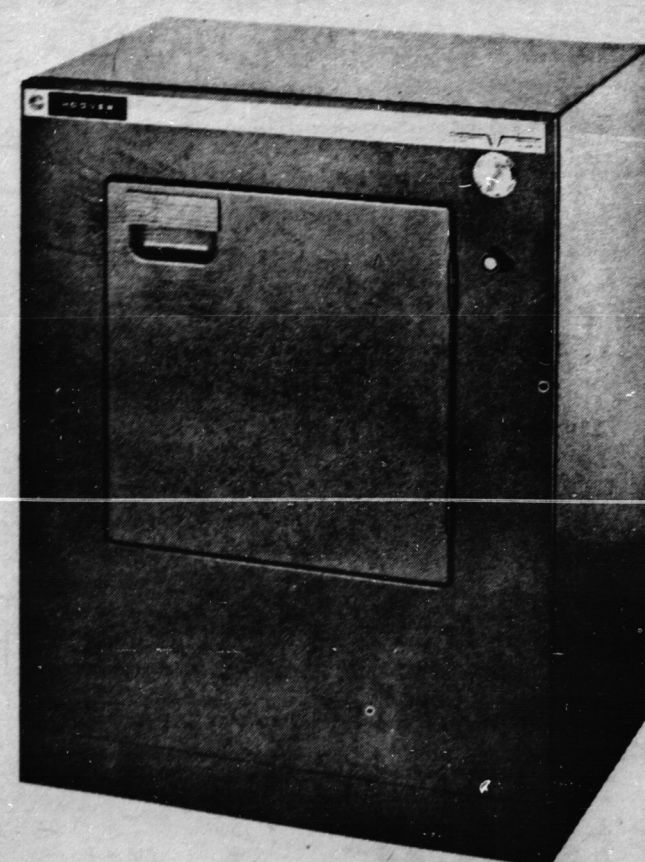
