NANTICOKE - A poll conducted by a seed corn company of Chatham last week at the International Plowing Match showed Premier William Davis as winning the election held Oct. 21.

The results were 1,317 votes or 49 per cent for Nixon, 1,053 votes, or 38 per cent for Lewis, and 2,723 votes were cast.

Separate Schools To Get Additions

SIMCOE - Three Haldimand county separate schools will gain additions to the existing structures, according to the Haldimand-Norfolk Roman Catholic Separate School Board.

Included in the \$1,000,000 three-year capital forecast released at the board's meeting last week are additions to St. Stephen's, Cayuga; St. Mary's, Hagersville and St. Michael's in Dunnville. Also included in the figures is an addition to St. Joseph's in Simcoe.

The forecast calls for building of the additions at St. Stephen's and St. Mary's in 1972 and at St. Michael's in 1974.

The building forecast is based partly on a survey of projected enrolment in the separate school system, also presented at Tuesday's meeting.

Principals of the school board prepared attendance projections until 1976. An over-all decrease in enrolment is predicted, following a general trend throughout the province.

Attendance this year is 2,816 with an anticipated decrease of 2,690 in 1976. Total elementary

school enrolment in Ontario is expected to drop from the present 1,300,400 to 1,184,500 in 1976.

Education superintendent of the board, L. L. Begley, said future building programs will concentrate on the "enrichment of education" in the system.

Mr. Begley said the objective of the building forecast is to provide the same basic facilities in all schools.

The addition to St. Stephen's in Cayuga will include a library-resource centre, a general purpose room and boys' and girls' change room. The total cost is anticipated at \$171,927.

A library-resource centre, general purpose room, change room and a classroom is planned for St. Mary's, Hagersville at a cost of \$261,740.

The addition planned for St. Michael's in Dunnville will consist of three classrooms, a library-resource centre, a general purpose room and change room. The anticipated cost is \$357,544.

Mr. Begley noted the capital forecast would be reviewed annually and is not

a commitment to spend this amount of money.

Tenders were opened at the meeting for an addition to St. Cecilia's in Port Dover. C. W. Buck, of Simcoe, was low bidder with a price of \$182,199.

PROTEST FARES KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)

The Waterloo County board of education and the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation have joined in protesting a recent increase in bus fares by the Kitchener Public Utilities Commission. They feel the 25 to 50 cents paid by students travelling by bus to and from school is causing some students hardship.
