

## Check Dumping Rules

WATERFORD - What will and what will not be allowed to be dumped in the new Woodhouse Township dump near Port Dover has raised the concern of Waterford Council members and last week they agreed to ask Township Reeve John Pow for clarification on points contained in the disposal area agreement.

Under the agreement lumber, trees, tree branches, stumps, stones and boulders over 200 pounds cannot be allowed in the dump.

Council was informed that Waterford is eligible for subsidy for storm sewers and maintenance provided the sewers meet one of four qualifications as set down by the department of transportation and communication.

For pipe under 27 inches in diameter, a one-half grant can be obtained and for larger pipe a one-quarter

grant. Council decided to look into the matter more closely before taking any action on the matter.

## Norfolk Justice Complex Tenders Opened In Toronto

SIMCOE - Tenders for the long-awaited Norfolk County Administration of Justice building were opened in Toronto last week with a St. Catharines firm being the low bidder.

Stewart and Hinan Construction Ltd., was the lowest of 13 tenders received by the Department of Public Works. The bid was for \$1,935,509. The highest tender submitted was from the London firm of John Hayman and Son Co., Ltd., at a total of \$2,020,000.

Tenders were called in mid-September following an

agreement with D. E. Jamieson, director of special projects, July 29 last year, to have the department take over the project.

A public works spokesman said the tenders are under consideration but that no final decision has been made. No date has been set for beginning work.

The two-storey building will provide space for a county or supreme court, two provincial courtrooms, one for use by the criminal division and the other for family court, jury rooms, judges' offices, sheriff's

offices, general offices and others. The building will also include a land title registry office, a small lunch room and mechanical rooms.

## Teatime Topics

More and more people are realizing that breakfast should be a substantial meal, designed to carry you through the day with no need for lunch.

The General Foods company has come up with a couple of recipes to help make a change in everyday breakfasts. One is a mixture of eggs and cereal baked in custard.

You need: 1½ teaspoon salted butter, 1½ cups bran flakes, 4 eggs, salt and pepper. Pour butter over cereal and toss lightly to mix. Form a nest in four greased tart cups or in four oiled sections of a muffin tin. Break eggs carefully, dropping one into each nest. Sprinkle with salt and pepper.

### Serves Four

Bake at 325 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until the eggs are firm. Loosen with a knife or spatula and lift out gently onto serving platter. Makes four servings.

A coffee cake with a fruit topping can be prepared the night before and baked to serve warm in the morning. For coconut peach kuchen, you need: ½ cup butter, ½ cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1½ cups unsifted all-purpose flour, 1 cup flaked coconut, 1 tablespoon quick cooking tapioca (this may be omitted if peaches are drained very thoroughly), 1 can (28 ounces) sliced peaches drained, 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/8 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 tablespoon butter, 1/3 cup flaked coconut.

### Make Cake

Cream ½ cup butter. Gradually add ½ cup sugar, creaming until very smooth. Mix in egg and lemon rind. Blend in 1½ cups flour and 1 cup coconut. Place dough in lightly greased 9-inch cake pan, gently spread to edge of pan. Chill 30 minutes. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes, or until lightly browned.

The cake may be baked the night before and the topping added in the morning.

For the topping, sprinkle tapioca evenly over top almost to the edge. Arrange drained peach slices over top. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Mix 3 tablespoons flour, 2 tablespoons sugar

and cinnamon. Cut in 1 tablespoon butter. Stir in remaining coconut. Sprinkle over peaches. Bake 20 minutes at 375 degrees. Serve warm. Makes 8 servings.
