If your local hockey, baseball or softball team has been taking a beating recently and you're in a quandary because the community just can't afford to field a better squad, take heart because there's someone worse off than you.

You might even consider taking the following story of woe and pinning it up on the local team's locker room door.

The story is about the fans and their heroes in the San Francisco-Oakland Bay area.

Your local baseball squad may have lost their last 15 games of the recent season, but then you never did expect them to make it to the World Series.

The Bay area fans did expect their teams to go that far and when your hopes are built up high, it hurts a lot more when they don't materialize.

San Francisco Giants and Oakland Athletics won their divisional titles in the National and American baseball leagues in early October which immediately promoted dreams of a Bay area World Series.

But, just like the Super Bowl between the Bay area teams that never came true 10 months ago, the World Series dreams collapsed when Pittsburgh Pirates and Baltimore Orioles won the baseball league pennants and went to the Series.

Finley still can't give away the broadcast rights

and says he's not going to pay anyone to carry the games either.

There may be other chances for a Bay area World Series or Super Bowl, but an Oakland Stanley Cup playoff looks a long way off.

Had the Giants and Athletics, who had already printed series tickets and programs, made it to the baseball world championship, it would have been the first single-area playoff since 1956 when Brooklyn Dodgers met New York Yankees.

The Giants' Candlestick Park and the Oakland Coliseum are only about 10 miles apart, separated by the bay.

Is it any wonder, then, that Charles O. Finley, owner of the Athletics is having trouble selling tickets for games of his Golden Seals in the National Hockey League?

The Seals finished last in the NHL West Division last spring and looked as though they could repeat the performance again this season.

Not only can Finley not sell tickets, he can't even give away rights on radio and television broadcasts of the Seals home games.

Finley says he paid a radio station \$90,000 last season to broadcast the games and paid a TV station another \$15,000 to carry telecasts of 10 games.

Hagersville Hurricanes lost their first game of the season to Simcoe by a score of 7-4. Butch Hill put Hagersville ahead with a field goal and a single. Hurricanes kept the pressure on Simcoe for three periods. They were down deep in Simcoe's end four times inside the 10 yard line, but they could not push the ball over for a major score. Simcoe scored a converted touchdown late in the fourth quarter for their margin of victory. This was a tough defensive struggle and a real tribute to the fine effort of their defensive coach Jim Styres.

The Hurricanes dropped their second straight game losing to Dunnville by a score of 20-13. Anthony Yacobino scored Hagersville's first touchdown on a 30 yard pass from Danny Forbes. HAGERSVILLE - Because Halloween falls on a weekend this year, children from Northview will be volunteering again to collect donations for UNICEF on Thursday, Oct. 28. These boys and girls, identified as being from Northview, will be making only one visit per home, each to a designated area of town.

Each year, the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund provides milk, medication, and related assistance to young people in less-privileged countries around the world - wherever the need may exist. Most recently, the organization has acted as a supply agency for refugees streaming from East Pakistan into India, and has brought in massive amounts of drugs, food, and shelter material as well as providing transportation facilities.

Swine Survey To Study Parasites

KEMPTVILLE - A survey of the incidence of internal swine parasites in eastern Ontario is about to under way.

Dr. G. C. Fisher, head of the Kemptville Veterinary Services Laboratory, says the survey is designed as a practical aid for producers. The aim is to increase

profits for the farmers by minimizing diseases. Although similar surveys have been carried out throughout the province, this is the first for eastern Ontario.

A team approach, involving agricultural representatives, industry representatives and farmers,

as well as Kemptville laboratory staff, will be involved in the survey. It will cover five swine herds in each of the 11 countries of eastern Ontario. Twelve fecal samples will be taken from each herd and analyzed at the Kemptville laboratory. Sows, weaners and growing pigs will be included in the survey.

licences in St. Thomas and London. The \$50 assured they would stand by their work."

Reeve Kincaid, however, maintained that "we don't want a bylaw we can't enforce. If we pass such a bylaw, who is going to enforce it?"

Coun. Geddes said the village has "all kinds of bylaws, but who is enforcing them. We're not ready for such a bylaw until we have a full time building inspector."

Reeve Kincaid said he had hoped that the Chamber of Commerce might pick this up. It has to

do with merchants in the municipality. If we insist on a licence for plumbers, that's okay with me, but if we're not going to enforce it, I want no part of it."

Council also decided it would request money spent for radio rental and repair for the fire department and recovered from the municipalities and that all other fire department accounts should be handled through the village.

Council was expressing concern about the way the two-way radio service was installed in the fire truck,

apparently without council knowing it was being done. The value of a two-way radio service was questioned and council noted that a full-time answering service that could provide radio contact for the fire department, police department and the works department vehicles would be of greater value.

Deputy-reeve Ross Slote said he was "not saying the radio is not necessary or not a good idea, I just don't like the way it was done. Walpole Township (which shares the cost) wants the minutes of the meeting where this was decided and we never had one. We should notify the fire chief that there will be no additions or deletions until it is brought before council."

In other business council: * Gave permission for the area Kinsmen Club to sell lottery tickets in the second Kin Lottery.

* Approved Tom Hodgson as Market Clerk at a salary of \$5 a week.

* Will attend a meeting of the Emergency Measures Organization Oct. 27 at 5 p.m.

* Noted tax arrears amount to \$11,510, an improvement of some \$4,000 from previous years.

* Praised the way in which the Hagersville area was decorated for the International Plowing Match banquet last Friday and the way in which the road to the area had been repaired to provide a smooth surface for all the cars and buses that arrived.

* Decided to publish several times a year sections of bylaws in order that residents may become more familiar with them. Council was concerned about the burning of leaves, which is prohibited under a bylaw, without a special incinerator and a permit from the fire chief.

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
