HAGERSVILLE - Drama and Theatre Arts are only two of many new courses being offered at Hagersville Secondary School. Theatre Arts, at year three, is mainly concerned with the development of the students' personality. Learning to meet other people with poise and confidence is high on our list of priorities.

Voice production and

basic movements such as how to walk and how to stand are also important. Learning to understand how other age groups and other people (such as parents and teachers) think and act is done by role playing.

The student pretends he is another person, such as the teacher; another student acts the part of the student, and they are given a situation for which they improvise conversation.

Being placed in such a situation gives students an understanding of the point of view of other people, and practise in presenting their own ideas. They also spend some time on short plays, usually composed by students themselves, choral reading, pantomime, skits and other theatrical skills.

The Theatre Arts course is an excellent preparation for the drama course in year five. This course is

concerned with the study of drama through acting. We have a small stage in the classroom, complete with (in the near future) lights.

On this stage the plays, acted and directed by graduates of the Theatre Arts course, come alive in a way in which they do not by merely being read. We look forward to a complete production to be presented to the public as a culmination of the course.

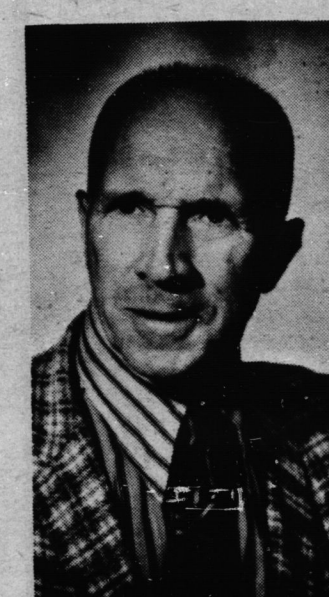
A 1968 Triumph motorcycle, licence 57-172 MC was stolen from Oneida Township, on Oct. 17, and has not been recovered as of this date.
