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Hagersville Ranger Explains Operation Outlook To Guides

HAGERSVILLE — At the October meeting of the Hagersville District leaders of the Girl Guides of Canada, Dale Hodgson, a Hagersville Ranger, was special guest.

In introducing Dale to the leaders, Mrs. D. Vanni, public relations secretary, explained that there were two phases of Operation Outlook — one in which the chosen Rangers went to Hamilton to run a day camp for a week, then study the social services available within the city. In the other phase, Rangers went north

past Sioux Lookout by plane to Indian reservations to help teenaged girls plan activity programs for the younger children.

Dale was selected by the provincial board of the Girl Guides of Canada to participate in the Hamilton phase.

Dale explained that this Operation Outlook actually started in 1969 when Rangers went to the North West Territories and Newfoundland to do service projects for the younger children. It was such an exciting venture that

Ontario decided to do the same type of thing.

The phase Dale took part in was two weeks long and took place in an urban centre and was headed by Mrs. Dorothy Crocker of Brantford.

At the Children's Aid Day Camp, six Rangers were responsible for the crafts, swimming, singing and total program for 24 children. Two leaders were also there each day.

Many of these children had never seen the country before. They were picked

up and delivered to their homes each day by leaders, given a snack, as well as lunch. They were divided into age groups.

The second week was spent with the social agencies in Hamilton — the Rangers helped at Dr. Rygiel's Home for the severely retarded. At Macassa Lodge and the Clarion Nursing Home, they helped with recreation. Travelling with the Victorian Order of Nurses, the Rangers saw all the patients, who come from all walks of life. They also saw

all parts and services of the Hamilton Health Department.

At night, the Rangers listened to different speakers, including people from the Junior League — a service group; from "Let It Bleed" — a drug centre; and from the Y.M.C.A.

Operation Outlook '71 was held with the hope that the girls involved would bring a similar program back to their own communities. Dale is very enthusiastic about starting such a program next summer.

The Montreal Expos have a second Canadian pitcher and both he and the National League baseball team seem more than pleased.

Ron Taylor — a Toronto native — joins Claude Raymond, veteran relief pitcher from St. Jean, Que., on the Expos staff.

Taylor, 33, was purchased for the Expos from the New York Mets of the National League.

"I'm very happy about it," said Taylor.

He said he feels the deal will be good for him and that he will be able to help the Expos.

"I'm still a pretty good relief pitcher but the Mets

have two real good ones — Tug McGraw and Danny Frisella.

"They got most of the work. I feel pretty good this

year, but it was frustrating the way I was used. I could understand it, however, but I often thought during the season that I could do a better job for some other team."

During his five seasons with the Mets, the six-foot-one-inch, 200-pounder set a club record of 269 game appearances as a pitcher. He led the team in 1967, 1968, 1969 and tied McGraw in 1970. In 1969 he set a Mets record with 14 saves.

Put Education First
During the last season, the strong-armed right-hander pitched 69 innings in 45 relief appearances, has a 2-2 record with two saves and an earned run average of 3.65. It was only the second time since he came up to the majors to stick — with St. Louis Cardinals in 1963 — that he had pitched in fewer than 50 games.

"It wasn't that I didn't get enough work with the Mets — it was the type of work. As a relief pitcher what really counts is to save games. But McGraw and Frisella were so good, they

got most of that work. I would get early relief jobs."

Taylor, a graduate of the Leaside League, was signed to a professional contract by the Cleveland Indians, but he delayed his own progress to the majors by insisting that he complete his education.
