

Results Of Winter Deer Survey Released By Lindsay District

A survey made in the northern half of the Lindsay Forest District indicates that 14,600 deer were available to hunters last fall and 1,200 animals died during the winter. The deer are scattered over 3,000 square miles; about four deer per square mile.

Of the 11,100 deer left this spring, about 50 percent or 5,500 are females. If 2,750 of these females become pregnant and each averages 1.5 fawns, 4,000 deer should be added to the population. Normal losses through spring and summer, however, due to cars, poachers, disease, accidents, old age and

predators should cut this addition down. Last winter was hard on deer and there may well be a lower fawning rate than usual. When all these factors are taken into consideration there may be about the same number of animals as last fall.

About 14,000 deer hunters are in Lindsay District during the deer hunt and the survey suggests there is about one deer available for each hunter. Hunters last year only harvested about .2 deer per hunter or had 20 percent success.

Winter losses were higher than normal this year with fawn suffering most.

fawns from last winter are the ones which will be producing more fawns in the coming years. If they had a serious die-off they will not be available to produce more offspring this year or next and as a result fewer deer can be expected.

The heavy, deep snows of last winter could have caused a much greater die-off of deer. However, it seems that the department of lands and forests extensive winter range improvement program kept losses to a minimum in major yarding areas.
