Teatime Topics

- Late summerables are a treat served or pickled to be served throughout the year. The Canada Department of Culture has suggestions preparing either one.

When they are small, and freshly picked, ground will serve four people. The small ones can be cooked whole and larger cut in 1/2-inch slices so will cook in the same about 15 minutes.

To serve minted carrots, 1 1/2 pounds until just tender, then drain. Add 2

tablespoons of butter, 1 1/2 tablespoons of honey and 1/2 teaspoon dried mint or 1/2 teaspoon chopped fresh mint. Stir and cook uncovered until carrots are glazed (2 to 3 minutes).

cheesecloth bag, 1 cup chopped onion, 1/2 cup chopped green pepper, 1/2 cup chopped sweet red pepper, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 3 cups white vinegar.

To make brine add salt to water. Soak cabbage and tomatoes separately in brine for 2 hours. Drain. Add remaining ingredients. Bring to boil and cook until relish is clear (about 20 minutes). Remove spice bag. Pack into hot jars and seal. Makes about 3 1/2 cups. May be stored one year.
