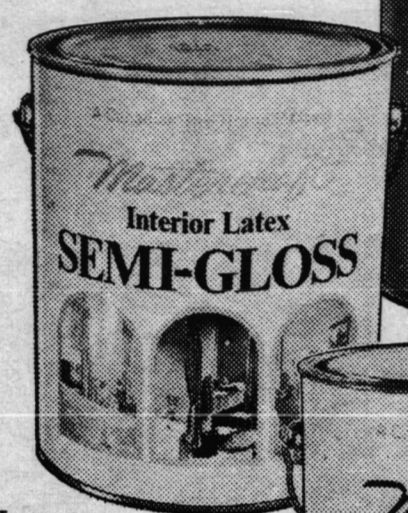

As all of you know, the year of dissolution is one of the very few personal prerogatives enjoyed quietly and exclusively by the head of government in a parliamentary system. I have, for the first time, exercised that personal prerogative today. I have called His Honour, the Lieutenant Governor, to dissolve the Legislature and a provincial general election will be held on Thursday, Oct. 21.

On becoming Prime Minister of Ontario in 1970, I was aware, as you would be, of the fact that I was holding office without a personal public mandate. It is natural, in these circumstances, that a government would be anxious to confirm its mandate at some early date.

Nevertheless, on taking office, I believed it essential to make a number of announcements of pressing public interest and concern. Some of these were confirmed existing ones.

MISS Enrollment 100

Hagersville Secondary School opened its doors on Sept. 7 to more than 900 students, who will be taught by 56 staff members. Each student has an individual timetable which will be the only one like it in the school.

Many subjects are taught at two or three levels because each student has chosen his subjects according to his abilities, interests, and personal taste. This term all students are on a full credit program, regardless of their previous record. Each subject taken, which has a workload of 110 to 120 hours (i.e. taught once a day five days out of six), will be worth one credit.

A student may take eight subjects (credits) in a year. Successful completion of 27 credits, including ten from the senior level (Year three and four) will obtain a Secondary School Graduation Diploma from Hagersville Secondary School.

Completion of six further credits from year five is necessary to be granted a Secondary School Honor Graduation Diploma. The terms "Grade 9" to "Grade 13" have been

Hagersville To Get Recreational Director?

HAGERSVILLE; A recreational director may be the solution to co-ordinating several boards running community projects in the Village.

meeting Monday after a delegation from the Hagersville Skating Club asked if there was a possibility to get more skating time.

Spokesman for the group Mrs. Richard Anderson told the council the club, which represents about 200 people, would like to get more ice time but didn't want to take time from other groups.

"We thought that possibly a look at the schedule and a revamping could give us more ice time. I am sure that our junior boys would even take early morning hours to get in their practice," she said.

Councilman Robert Gedyne then suggested that possibly the only way to co-ordinate all the activities in the town would be to get a professional recreation director.

Councilman Norman Crawford agreed that was part of the solution but stated the need was for a combination board first.

This would also give the Village more Ontario grants for recreation, he said. Councilman Gedyne and Reeve Ross Sote, members of the Arena Board, were instructed to check out the matter.

In other business council heard a complaint about its ruling not to allow liquor licenses for adults using facilities at the Hagersville Secondary School.

Robert Slack told council that he has always used the Jarvis Community Centre for a speedway banquet. "However, in the last few years this hall has become too small to handle the affair which is attended by about 500 people."

"It seems that even with the excellent facilities at the school it isn't made available to responsible individuals or groups who want to have a liquor license."

"Hagersville is the only community that has decided that liquor license won't be allowed for its school."

Councilman Gedyne commented that the only place that the council has a say, is at the school. Ontario Liquor Board makes the decision for other places. "It's pretty big buck passing if you ask me."

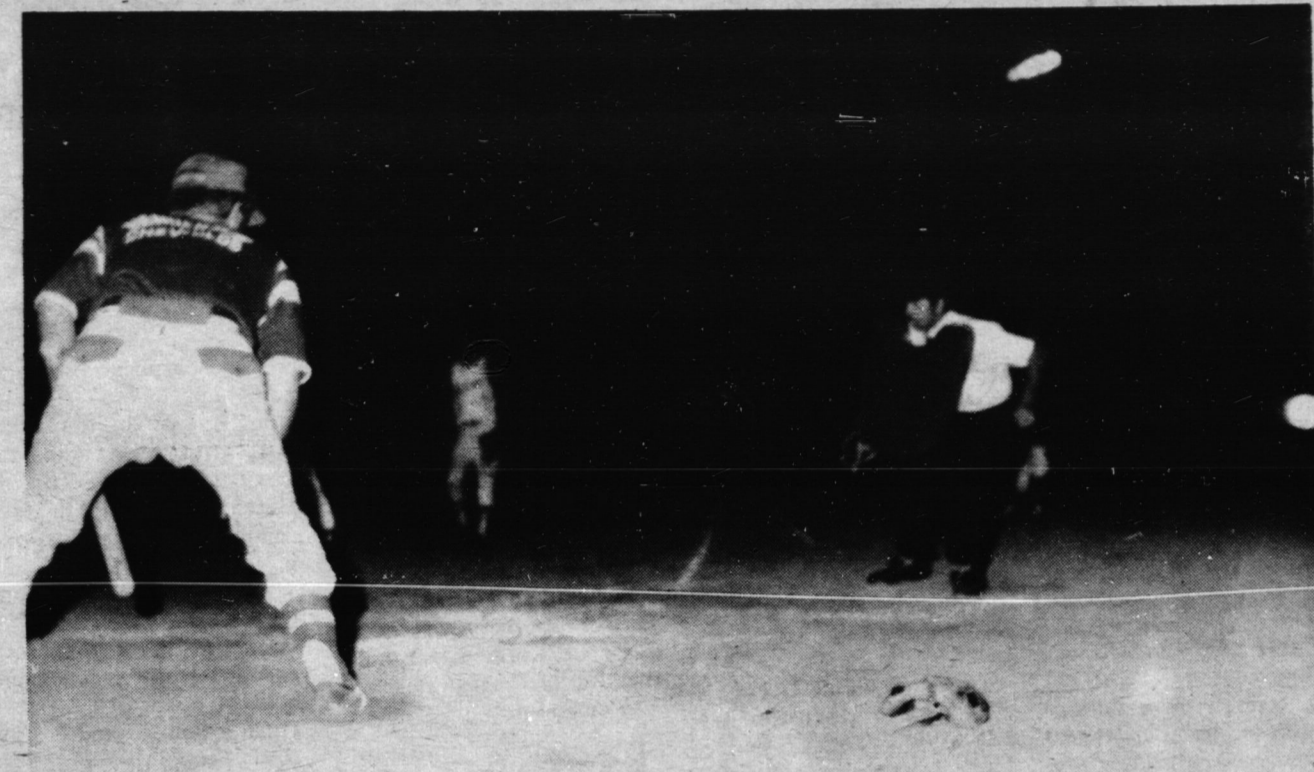
Mr. Slack told council that a banquet at which liquor is consumed illegally is held at the arena every year. "It might better be held at the school legally"
