Judges' Qualifications

A man who has had a decision go against him in may be inclined to agree with a Canadian legal hority that some judges don't know enough about

But the authority, E. A. Tollefson, has some uses for the judges. He says that while all anyone can e to have is a modest knowledge of two or three nches of law, judges are expected to be experts in the

Mr. Tollefson is a former law professor at the iversity of Saskatchewan and now works for the eral justice department. He made his comments about ges in an article for the law journal or the University

The authority says that law teachers often bemoan quality of judgements in Canadian courts. They npare them adversely with decisions of judges in tish courts.

But there's a good reason for that, says Mr. lefson. Canadian judges are asked to decide questions m practically every area of the law.

On the other hand, British courts have for years n largely specialized so that judges are free to centrate on particular areas of the law such as perty, divorce and probate.

Mr. Tollefson thinks that specialization is one orm Canadian courts ought to be allowed to dertake. He also thinks that the courts should be mitted to hire researchers for judges and to make ater use of outside experts in certain fields of law to p the judge in complex cases.

Mr. Tollefson also has another idea to make sure t only qualified men get on the bench. He thinks that ected lawyers should be required to take a one-year icial training course after passing an admission amination. Then those who pass the course would go standby until a judicial vacancy occurs.


