A number of readers of this column, comment on their interest in reading about the game of lawn bowling and ask that I continue to include some of the rules of the game.

Lawn bowling can be played with either two on a team known as doubles or three known as trebles or with four known as fours. Rule No. 7 of the Provincial Lawn Bowling Association deals with fours play as follows:

Fours Play - (1) The rink and fours play. (a) Designation of players. A side shall consist of four players, named respectively, lead second, third and skip, according to the order in which they play, each playing two bowls. (b) Order of play. The leads shall play their two bowls alternately, and so on, each pair of players in succession to the end. No one shall play unless his opponent's

Plan Windbreaks Now For Spring Planting

Farmers should start planning now, if they are considering planting a tree windbreak next spring. As well as adding to the beauty of the farm, trees have many additional benefits. Harold Clapp, livestock specialists, Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food in Guelph, says a windbreak can be beneficial for the beef and dairy producer.

For the feedlot operator, trees will help to break the wind and prevent a buildup of snow around buildings. A windbreak will also permit a farmer to let his animals out daily during the winter.

When animals are confined for the entire season, breeding problems can develop. An added benefit, say horticulturists, is that trees can also help prevent wind erosion or act as a snow fence along roads.

As a temporary solution for this winter, farmers should consider

As a temporary solution for this winter, farmers should consider farmer if he has planned his windbreak for the right location. A poorly placed windbreak could add to a snow or wind problem.

By planning now, farmers can prepare the soil, and order trees in time for

planting time next spring. Further information on windbreaks is available from local offices of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food.
