(CP) - Irving Ungerman, manager of the Canadian heavyweight boxing champion, George Chuvalo, a big decision on his

to be a better fight for George," said Ungerman. "On the other hand, the Frazier fight would be for the title - but that isn't necessarily out of the question, anyway." Ungerman, who had turned down several requests for less alluring money for his fighter would

prefer that Chuvalo, 33, retire. His thinking is that if Chuvalo is to fight, he might as well make it worth his while. "I'm confident the Clay bout will take place," he said. The Montreal bout between Frazier and Chuvalo, now all but ruled out, would have meant a purse of \$50,000 for Chuvalo and \$100,000 for Frazier.

Council Also: - Heard a request from Tom Howe to raise dumping fees for the village at his site from \$300 to \$800 a month. Council decided to check other alternatives before making a decision.

- Sent a letter of thanks to Charles Dagleish of Manner Apartments, for a banquet celebrating the start on a 18-unit apartment building. Reeve Kincaid turned the sod at the special ceremony last week.

- Approved a license for a series of bingo from Sept. 28 to Oct. 9 to raise funds to send the Hagersville Secondary School Concert Band to Europe next year.

- Learned that a water dealer had helped himself to five tanks of Hagersville water from a hydrant last week. Council decided to send a letter to the man stating he would have to get permission from now on before taking water.

Councilman Crawford told council he had learned something about Hagersville water: "I find it is the best in the country to use to fill a swimming pool. That's what that water was used for," he said.

- Learned tax arrears now total \$14,500 - less than five percent of the total revenue of \$357,000.

- Increased compensation coverage for volunteer firemen from a maximum of \$7,000 to \$9,000.

There is a return match scheduled for that pair, probably in Houston next June. The principals split \$5 million in the first one.

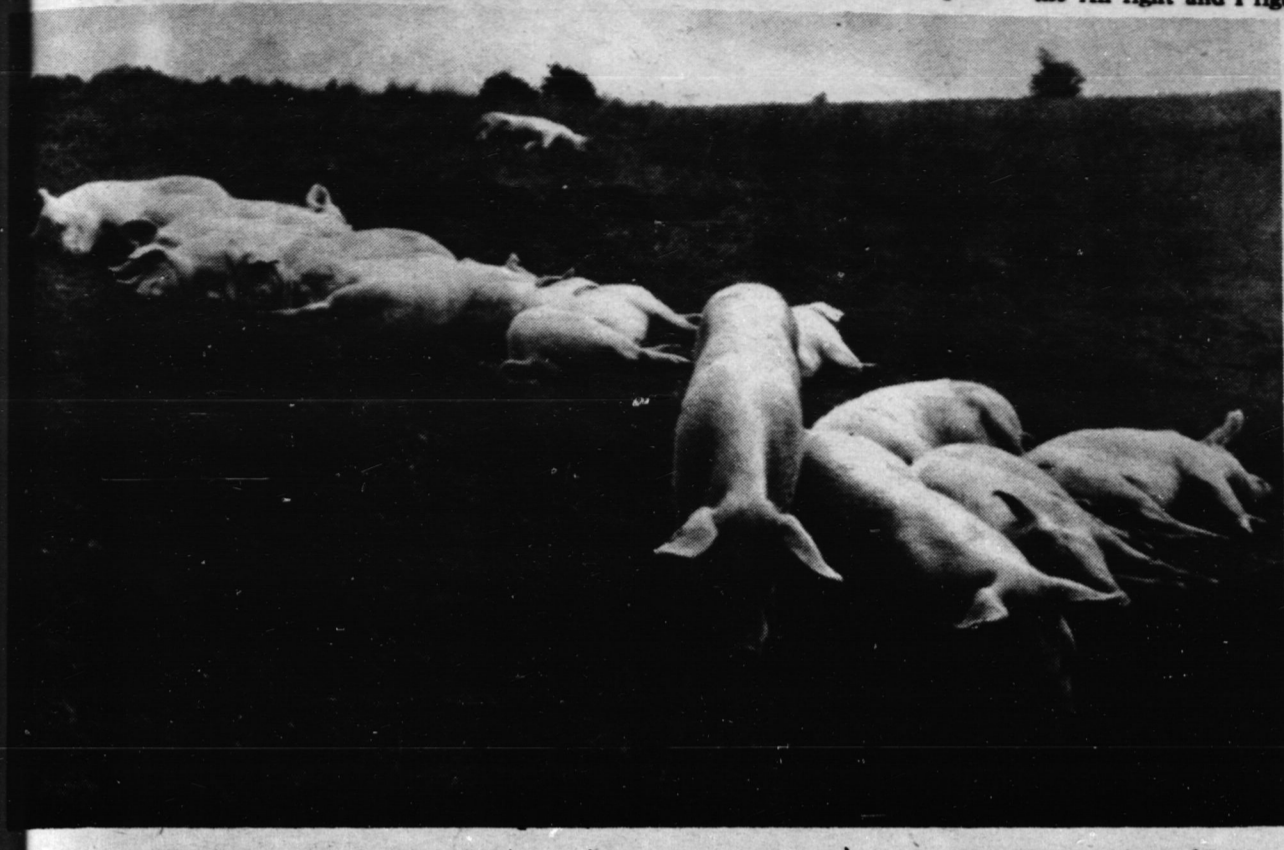
Ali meeting Chuvalo could be interpreted as one of several warmups for the return against Frazier, a good, tough opponent.

Chuvalo is one of three fighters who has taken Ali, also known as Cassius Clay, 15 rounds. Ernie Terrell and Frazier were the others.

Chuvalo accomplished it in a title fight at Maple Leaf Gardens 5 1/2 years ago, but lost on a unanimous decision. Against Frazier. Four years ago, Chuvalo lost on a fourth round technical knockout at New York's Madison Square Garden.
