Rockford

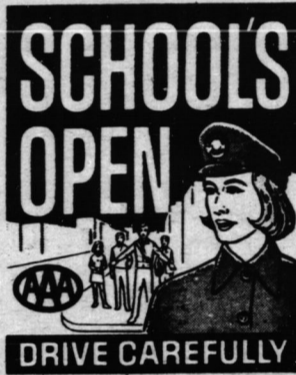
Jill Shields and Lynn Reid of Ottawa spent several days over the holiday weekend with Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Lemery and family.

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Federation News

The mass media has placed great emphasis on the effects of President Nixon's announced 10 percent surcharge on various business and industrial goods entering the U.S.

Although they have somehow managed to overlook us, this most recent U.S. blow will hit hard and perhaps the hardest on our nation's already depressed farm

situation. This concern was reflected in a release by the Canada Department of Agriculture which stated "while obviously there is real concern throughout all segments of the economy,

perhaps it is greatest in the agricultural field because of the perishable nature of most agricultural products. Irrespective of trading changes and possible barriers, harvesting of crops

particularly fruits and vegetables — must go on as the crops reach maturity. In the same manner, livestock and poultry have to be sold when they reach market weight.

The result of floating the U.S. dollar and ensuing devaluation causes: (a) Canadian exports to the U.S. to be expensive to U.S. importers, (b) Canadian imports of U.S. products to be cheaper, and (c) the competitive position of Canadian exports in third country markets vis-a-vis U.S. products to deteriorate.

The total amount of Canadian agricultural exports affected by this surcharge is 66 percent and many of these products are already in distress. Some of these items are listed as follows and are mainly ones for which Canada supplies 75 percent or more: maple syrup, apples, potatoes, oats, pork, poultry, dairy cows and numerous more. Some exempted products are such frivolous things as horse hides-whole, fur tails, paws, pieces-raw, hoofs and horns-crude, animal manure, etc. All of these named and many more are products for which Canada exports a grand net value of 0 dollars to the U.S.

The farm situation of late has been extremely dim and the picture, due to internal and external problems, doesn't appear very enlightening in the immediate future.

Jarvis Community Hall Board

As the council's representation numbers two, Klass Druyff and Ted Oldham, and the WI has two representatives, Mrs. R. A. Having been an earnest worker on the Board for ten years, Mr. Davidson called the meeting to order and nominated Robert Nixon as chairman, drew attention to a list of repairs needed in the immediate future, handed over the keys and withdrew from the meeting. He stated that he would continue to assist the Custodian on the "grounds."

Mr. Nixon assumed the chair. Discussion re: repairs and finances followed. Another Board meeting will be called before the end of the year. Adjournment was declared.

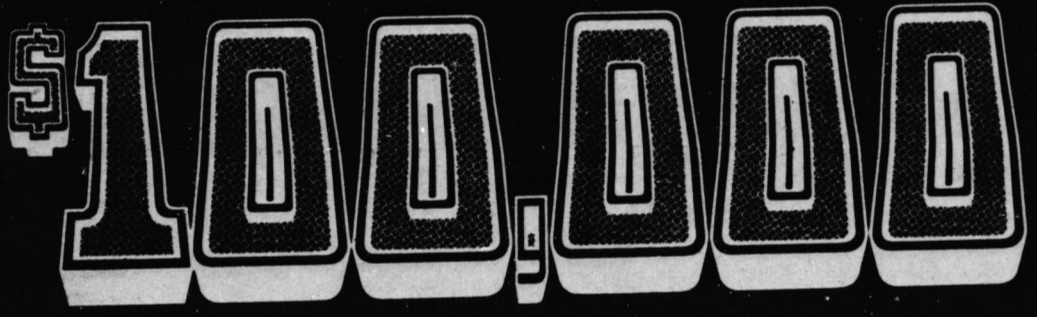

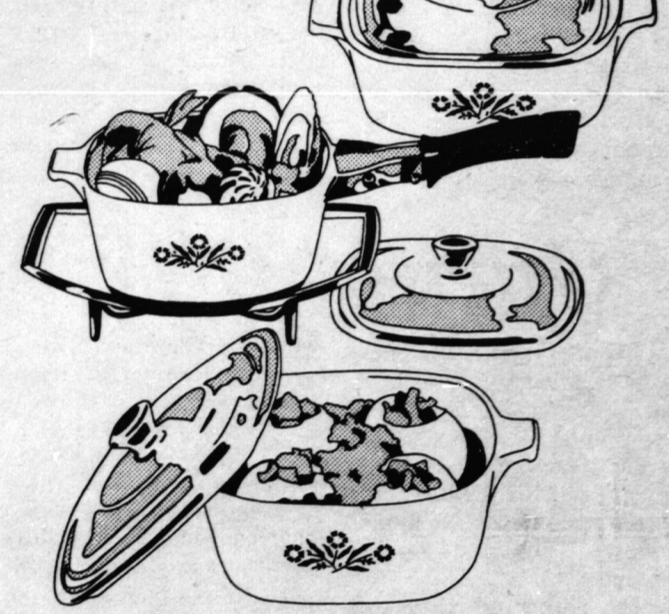
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
