Ontario Pork Producers' Marketing Board

Ontario pork producers decided last week to investigate further a proposal for a pork insurance scheme that would protect producers when the market price falls below the cost of production.

Producers would make contributions to the program when the price of hogs was over \$30 a hundredweight; provincial and federal governments would match the producer contributions.

Ingersoll area farmer William Bilderback made the proposal at the semi-annual convention of the Ontario Pork Producers' Marketing Board in Toronto. It received overwhelming support from county delegates.

Woodstock area farmer Wilfred Bishop described the proposal as the most significant to come before the pork producers' organization in the past 10 years.

The pork insurance program would work this way. Producers would pay a minimum of one percent of the market value of their hogs towards the insurance fund when the base price of hogs is over \$30.

The Ontario government would match the producer contributions to the fund, in the same way as they now match producer contributions to crop insurance.

The insurance fund would be held in a solid fund, drawing interest, until the price of hogs fell below the cost of production. Producers would then begin receiving payments. Not sufficient to make hogs profitable; but to protect producers from very severe financial losses.

"There must still be some inducement for producers to cut down production when prices are low," one Bruce county producer commented. "Otherwise the market price would never recover."

Under Bilderback's proposal, only higher quality hogs would get payouts from the insurance fund.

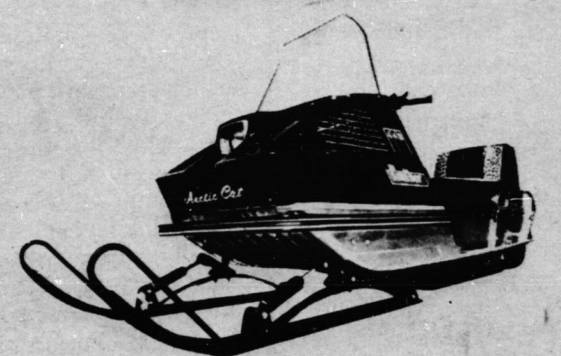
