

New Look, New Program For Canada's Rangers

Canada's Rangers, the senior branch of the Girl Guides of Canada, launched a new program, complete with new uniforms and a new handbook at a countrywide conference Aug. 23-28, held in Winnipeg.

Meeting with 50 leaders and 14 representatives of other youth organizations, 125 Rangers from every province, as well as the Yukon and Northwest

Territories, finalized plans for the new program. Also represented were members of Canadian Rangers on foreign soil, whose parents are stationed abroad with Canada's Armed Forces.

The program is the culmination of more than two years of research carried on among girls of Ranger age (14-18) across Canada, both within and outside the organization. Designed by the girls

themselves, the loosely structured program stresses individual potential, interests and skills, adventure and travel, camping and co-ed activities.

Those who attended the conference will help implement the program in their own home areas.

Introduced at the conference was the new uniform, also chosen by the girls. Made of practical navy

crimpolene it comprises A-line skirt, pants, vest and jacket with a choice of long or short sleeved blouse or rolled neck sweater. A white scarf printed with red maple leaves may also be worn.

Special guests at the conference were Mrs. K. B. Clysdale of St. Mary's Ontario, recently retired as chief commissioner for Canada, and Mrs. W. P. Guro, the new chief commissioner of Canada.

Mrs. Russell Ball of Drummondville, Quebec and Sheila Young, a Ranger from St. John's, Newfoundland, co-chaired the event.

Miss Pat Petracca of Hagersville, Ranger Captain, as well as commissioners for Guiding in Haldimand, took part in the Conference. At the first meeting of the Hagersville Ranger Company, Miss Petracca told the girls about the new program, encouraging them

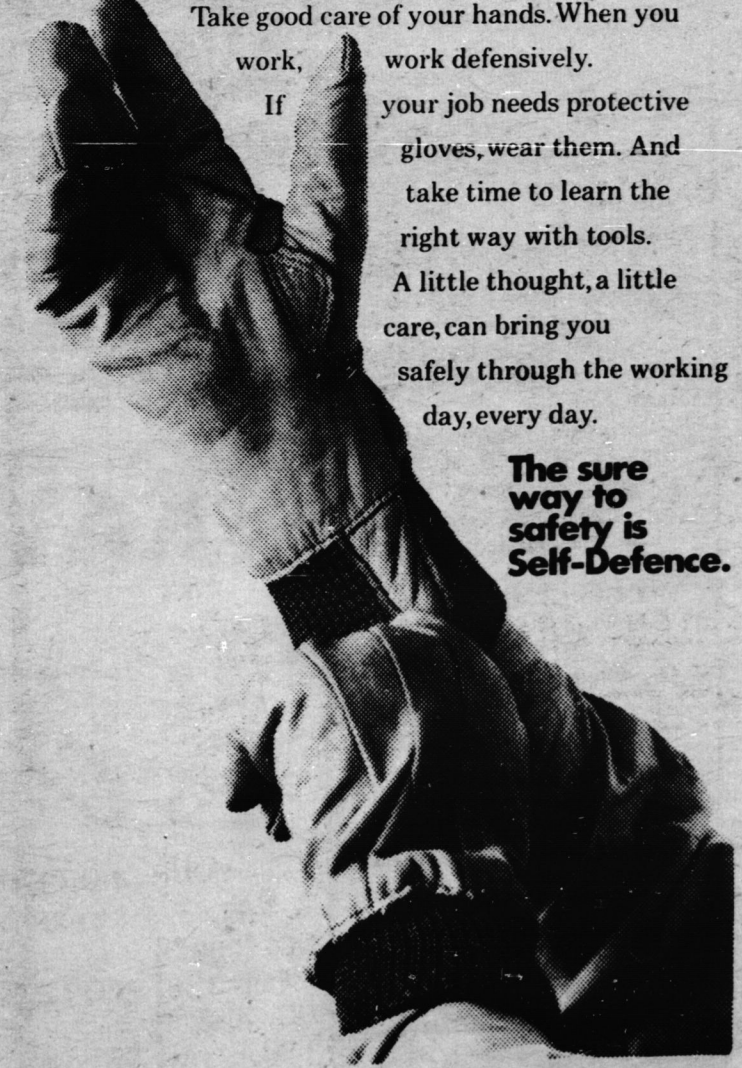
