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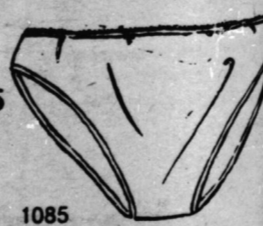
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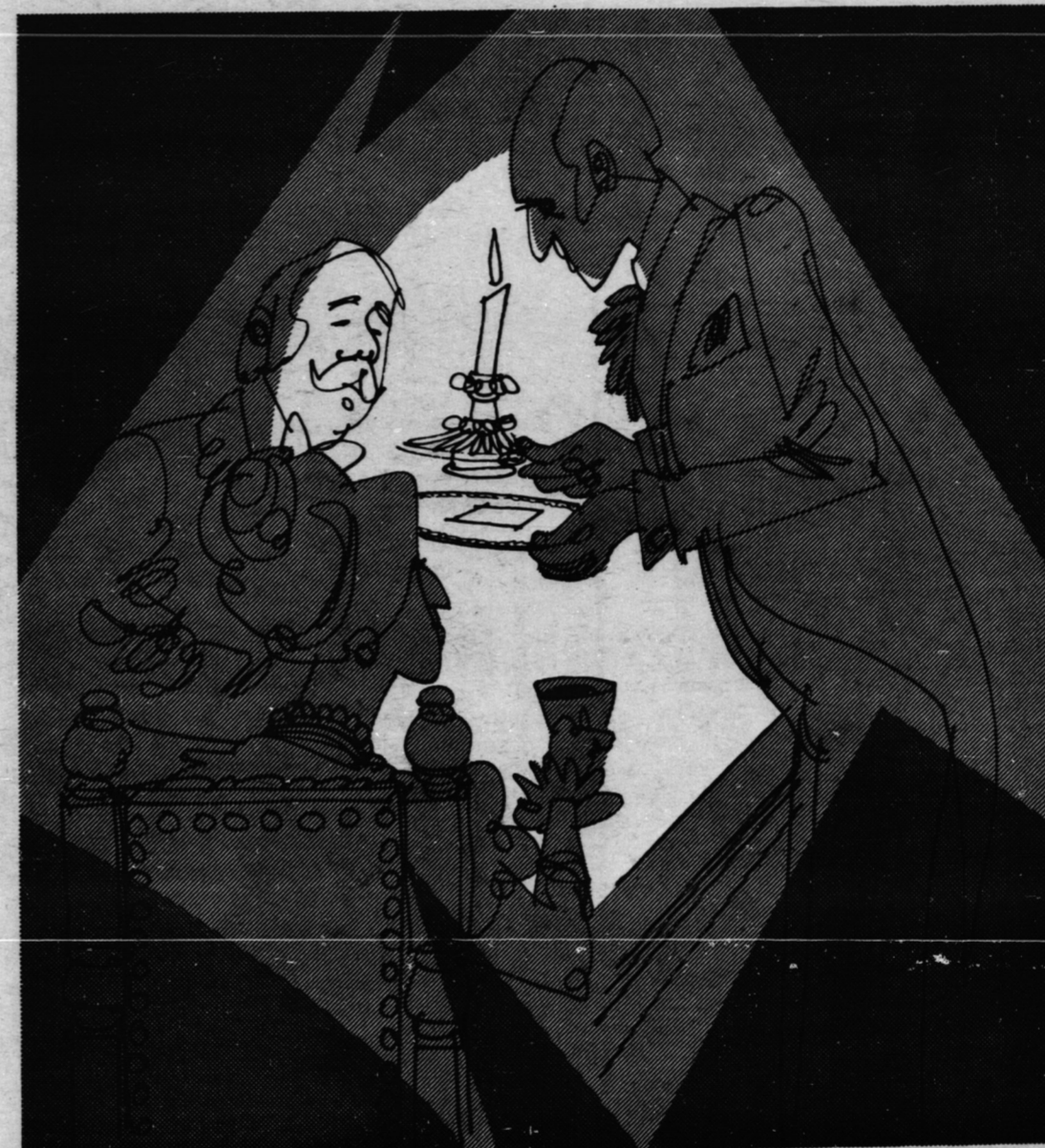

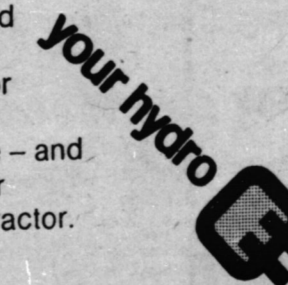
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On The Green

Well it is getting near the end of Lawn Bowling for the season, and it is getting near the end of the book of rules also. So this week we will talk about Rule No. XV - Duties of Markers.

(1) He shall centre the Jack and shall place a full-length Jack two yards from the ditch.

(2) He shall ensure that the Jack is not less than 25 yards from the front edge of the mat after it has been centred.

(3) When play is in progress he shall stand still on the centre line of the rink at least 3 yards behind the Jack. When a long Jack is shown he shall stand still on the centre line of the rink and on the bank.

(4) He shall answer affirmatively or negatively a player's enquiry as to whether a bowl is Jack high. If requested, he shall indicate the distance of any bowl from the Jack, or from any other bowl, and also, if requested, indicate which bowl he thinks is shot, and or the relative position of

any other bowl.

(5) He shall chalk all "touchers" and mark the position of the Jack and "touchers" in the ditch. He shall remove all non-"touchers" from the ditch and all "dead bowls" to the bank.

(6) He shall not move, or cause to be moved, either Jack or bowls until each player has agreed as to the number of shots.

(7) He shall measure carefully all doubtful shots when requested by either player. If unable to come to a decision and an umpire has not been appointed, he shall select one. The decision of the umpire shall be final.

(8) He shall enter the score at each end and shall intimate to the players the state of the game. When the game is finished he shall see that the score card, containing the names of the players and disposed of in accordance with the rules of the competition.

efficient in their enterprise. One of the new features on the mill is a front-end loader, to move raw feed into the hammer-mill and is an attempt to eliminate rear-end collisions while manouevring the machine into position on the farm. The vehicle comes equipped with in-cab controls and a dust-tight conveyor system that traps the fine material in the mixer.

The mill will carry up to a ton of liquid protein and an additional ton of molasses and the mixer will handle up to 4,000 pounds of feed on one load.

More than 30 mobile mill owners turned out for the demonstration and some were critical of the apparent lack of space for concentrate storage. Company officials say the truck frame can be stretched to accommodate the extra load behind the driver's cab.

Re-designed unloading mechanisms will speed up the discharging operation from the mixer and could save as much as ten minutes a load for the operators. Good operators for the mobile mills are at a premium several owners said who attended the show and the manufacturer claims the efficiency of the unit will alleviate labor problems.

The demonstration was held at the newly-opened Explorer Inn in Jarvis.
