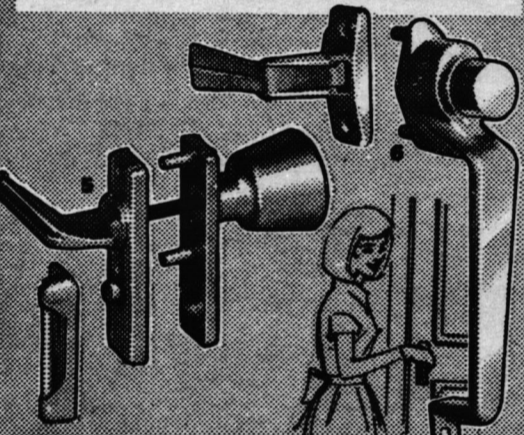

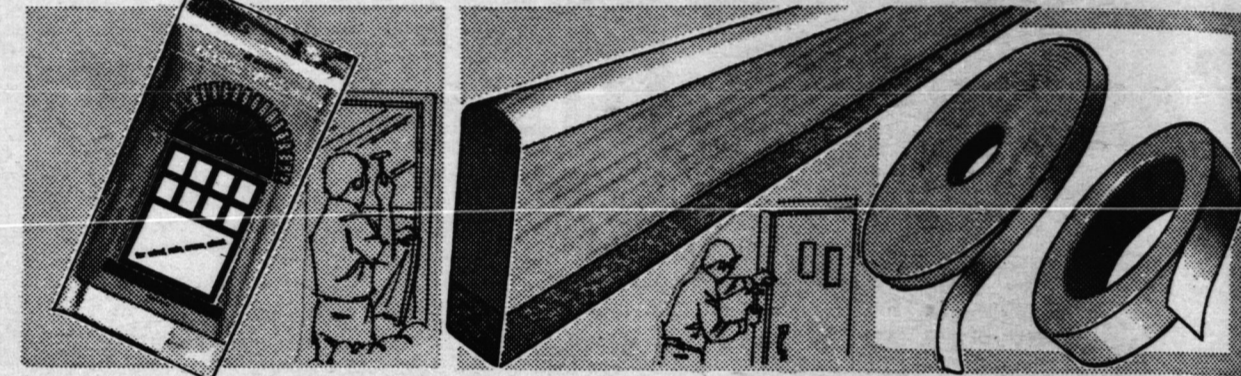

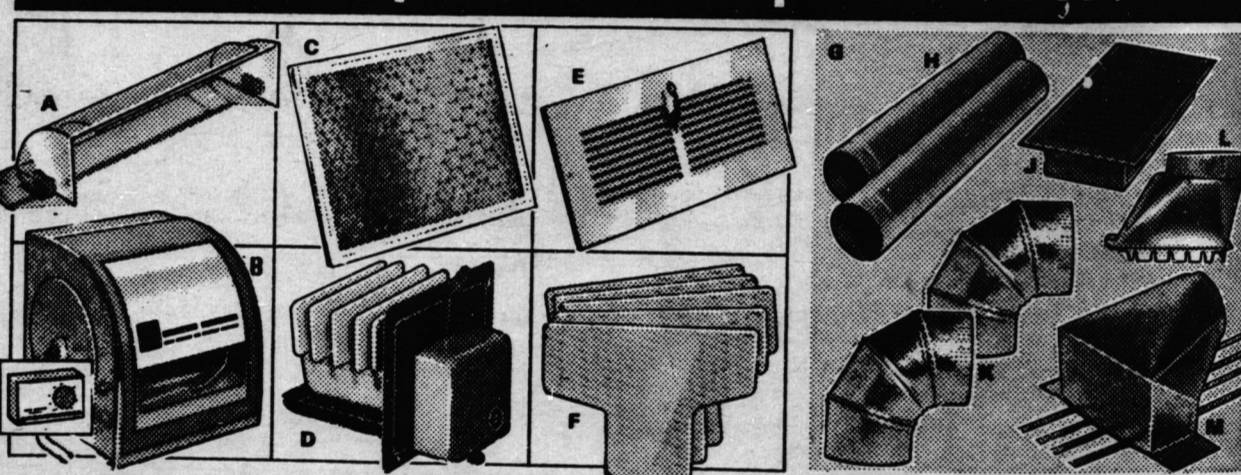

## Haldimand-Norfolk PCs Nominate James Allan

IS - James N. Allan was acclaimed to try sixth term in the Legislature at a Conservative caucus meeting for and-Norfolk riding Wednesday. 600 supporters at the Community hall demonstrations and ballyhoo to show their support for one of Ontario's veteran MPPs, who has been a member of the Ontario government since 1951.

Mr. Allan emphasized his confidence in the return of the PC government because of "a new era under new leader, Bill Davis."

Mr. Allan added that each of the previous three premiers were in tune with people during their tenure of office as Mr. Davis will be.

He declared the government is more concerned with the "affairs of people than the creation of things."

He gave bouquets to the area county councils and study committees which have been conducting studies on regional government.

"I have great confidence in municipal governments and I am confident these people will come up with the right decision," he said.

"I don't know whether or not this decision will be for regional government but if the county councils decide it will be, it will be put together in a way you will be proud," he declared.

Guest speaker for the evening was Ontario Food and Agriculture Minister William A. Stewart. He contended that Ontario has no other alternative to the "Bill Davis government."

"Either Ontario moves ahead under the PC policies of the leader of the party or surrenders to decadent socialism under the New Democratic Party or into disorganized confusion with the Liberals, whose leader comes down on all issues with both feet planted solidly in mid-air on both sides of the political fence," said Mr. Stewart.

He said these are important times and "Ontario either moves ahead under the momentum it has been able to generate under the excellent leadership it has been given."

Other platform guests were Arrel Martindale, of Caledonia, Vern Kneale of Simcoe, Tom Kline of Walpole, Ken Green of Simcoe and William Knowles MP for Norfolk-Haldimand.

Don Duxbury of Walpole made the nomination. Also contending the riding are Alfred W. Judd of Simcoe, Liberal and Thomas Tobey, NDP of Caledonia.

## Haldimand Hard At Last Minute Planning For Match

TICOKE - With less than two weeks to go before the annual plowing match is under way, the Haldimand County Plowing Match Committee is in the final stages of planning for the event to get under way Oct. 12.

General chairman for the match, Ted Montague, of RR 1 Jarvis, indicated preparations are in the final stages and everything is going for the event to get under way Oct. 12.

Exhibitors participating in this year's match are expected to begin constructing their temporary displays near the end of the week and when completed will cover more than 75 acres on the Harewood Acres farm.

Haldimand county committee members are especially proud of the tented city's paved streets—a first for the International in Ontario. The plowing spectacles have annually been plagued with fall rains that turn grassy walkways around the match into mud bowls under the tramping of some 100,000 people. But officials are hopeful the weatherman will co-operate even with the paved streets.

More exhibit space in the city has been sold for the match in 1971 than ever throughout the illustrious three-quarter century history of plowing exhibitions in the province.

The International received its name in 1926, according to Ontario Plowmen's Association records and has been growing steadily since, to the expected 100,000 attendance this year.

Haldimand County made a bid for the match in 1965 and it was approved by the OPA a year later. A steering committee will soon be conducting a survey of Jarvis to determine the need and demand for family housing.

## In Jarvis OHC Conducts Housing Survey

Ontario Housing Corporation will soon be conducting a survey of Jarvis to determine the need and demand for family housing.

A research team from OHC, the Ontario government's housing agency, will estimate the number of families living or working in the community whose housing is inadequate or beyond their financial capabilities.

The study was requested by Jarvis Council.

It will include an assessment of economic trends, growth factors and current and future housing needs in the municipality. In this regard, interviews will be conducted with such community representatives as municipal officials, businessmen, social and welfare workers and the clergy.

Some interested persons may not be reached by direct mail and in this case OHC urges them to obtain a questionnaire from the municipal offices.

If the survey shows a need for family housing, it will likely be two-storey or semi-detached or row design. The size of the units varies with community needs, but they can have as many as four or five bedrooms. Rent is related to total family income and includes service charges for heat, hot and cold water.

## Cayuga Officially Opens \$850,000 Pollution Plant

CAYUGA - A new \$850,000 sewage treatment plant was officially opened here Friday night by R. D. Johnston, Ontario Water Resources Commission chairman.

A tour of the new facilities, which have been in operation for the past several months, marked the opening. The OWRC paid half the cost of the new plant.

The ribbon cutting ceremony was done at the Cayuga Arena and was followed by a dance.

Original plans called for dancing in the streets, but the event was shifted indoors because of the chilly weather and dust created by workmen reconstructing Highway 3.

The plant is working at about one-quarter its capacity and is designed to treat about 200,000 gallons a day and handle a population of 1,800.

The basic principle of the operation is to keep the sewage moving, breaking down the solids and adding oxygen to cultivate bacteria which will consume the wastes.

By the time the sewage passes through the final stages of chlorination and is returned to the Grand River, engineers say 95 per cent of the pollution has been removed.
