## Sports Camera

(CP) - After 25 years of professional hockey in the National Hockey League, Gordie Howe has started new careers. That's careers.

The 43 year old Howe took the step by confirming his retirement. Now he moves into another arena - the arena of big business. He becomes part of Bruce Norris's diversified ind empire with its many corporations, including the Detroit Red Wings.

Besides having a hockey title, Howe will also have legal titles with Norris-owned corporations. His hockey duties will be on a broad scale and not confined solely with the Wings, the team he helped build to greatness.

He will be involved not only with the Wings, but also the American Hockey League farm club at Tidewater and the Central League team at Fort Worth, as well as the scouts.

Before his retirement, Howe was already vice-president of a Norris owned insurance company.

Now his career as an executive will become more complex as he moves in as an officer of various Norris corporations.

Gordie confessed: "It scares me a little."

It wasn't the hundreds of stitches that made Howe quit playing hockey, or the effects of a concussion 20 years ago that left him with a permanent twitch. It wasn't the separated shoulders or torn ligaments. It was arthritis.

However, even last season Howe was superb. He had undergone a pre-season operation on his arthritic left wrist. Then he was bothered by an attack in the right elbow. Then he missed a month when he tore a cartilage in his right rib cage. He w up with 23 goals, 29 assists and 52 points - better figures than he totalled in his rookie year.

When he scored his 700th goal some seasons back (no one else has scored 600), there remained one novel prize for Howe. Unfortunately, he won't attain it. He wanted to play on the same line with his oldest son, Marty. But the rules were changed, and players cannot turn professional until they are 20. Marty is only 17.

Howe was elected an all-star 21 times. Only one other player, Allan Stanley, ever played 21 seasons. Howe was the most valuable player six times and he led the league in scoring six times. Two years ago, in his 23rd season, he set a record for the most assists and most total points by a right-winger. His 786 career goals are 232 more than the runner-up, Bobby Hull, has achieved. He is second in penalty minutes - to Ted Lindsay, who played 17 seasons.
