



REPORT

On Sept. 24, 1971, at 11.15 p.m., Prov. Const. W. L. Bessey investigated a one car motor vehicle collision on the Kohler Road, North Cayuga Township about 1 mile south of No. 3 Highway. Driver of the car, Clark Patterson, age 20, Caledonia, Ont., received serious head injuries, treated at Hagersville Hospital and transferred to the Hamilton General and reported to be in fair condition. Two passengers also from Caledonia were treated and released with minor injuries. The vehicle failed to negotiate the curve on the Kohler Road at the Irish Line. Twelve other motor vehicle collisions were investigated with injuries sustained to four persons.

In the previous edition of the press release, it was reported that the Oneida Central School had been

entered and a quantity of childrens insurance money was stolen. As a result of the investigation conducted by Prov. Const. J. Hanes, four youths, all over 16 years of age, and not students of the Oneida School, have been charged with break, enter and theft. A ski-doo snow vehicle recovered burnt with motor missing by Brantford OPP.

On Sept. 20, 1971, Prov. Const. Q. J. Boon, investigated a break and enter at Melvin Nigh B.P. office on Mud Street, Walpole Township. Entry gained by forcing north door with no theft taking place.

Education Committee Norfolk Unit Cancer Society

Mrs. C. M. Watters, of Delhi, education chairman for the Norfolk Cancer Society called an evening meeting on Sept. 22 at the Simcoe Lodge Restaurant in Simcoe when a new film was shown "Give Hope a Boost."

Education conveners and other officers were present from Norfolk branches and from Burford. Those present were brought up to date regarding cancer control by Fred Matthews, education chairman for the Iroquois district, from Lincoln, and Miss Elizabeth Pierson from Niagara Falls who showed the new "Lung Transparency which may be shown in any room by using an overhead projector.

Films and transparencies may be rented for 75 cents but must be applied for about 10 days in advance. The speaker listed aids to cancer patients and their families and asked for volunteers to send in their names to their own

branches. He noted the importance of cancer booths at the local fairs and the fact that the Public Health nurse can help cancer patients by obtaining pain relieving drugs.

Mr. Matthews closed by emphasizing that education should be kept light-hearted.

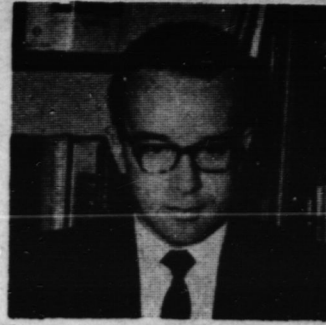
The Princess represents Haldimand County in the Provincial Competition at the CNE. Last year's princess came very close to winning the provincial title, this year ending in the first runner up position.

Dental Plans Taking Root

Development of province-wide dental plans across Canada may be taking root in southwestern Ontario.

A four-year test program involving 2,000 children is beginning in Waterloo County. The project would give the taxpayer, their elected representatives and the dental profession some idea of what a province-wide program would cost in dollars and manpower for initial dental care.

Two groups of 1,000 three-year-olds will be started in two successive

years. They will be given detailed initial examinations and be taught and shown good preventive dental care. Their teeth will be given fluoride "baths" and will be given regular dental treatment such as fillings, extractions and space maintenance.

Counseling will be made available to parents in needs involving the use of dental specialists. Waterloo County health unit dental staff will carry out the screening and counseling and in some cases will provide radiographs and fluoride applications. The rest of the treatment will be in the hands of practising dentists.

Planners and operators of the project include representatives from the county health unit, University of Toronto faculty of dentistry and the Waterloo-Wellington Dental Society. — Canadian Dental Association.
