Hagersville Council Rents Arena For Oct. 16 Banquet

HAGERSVILLE — The town council last week agreed to rent the Hagersville Arena for three days in order that the men's Banquet.

The rental fee requested by the arena and County Association.

In connection with the International Plowing Match being held Oct. 12 at Harewood Acres and east of Jarvis, the Hagersville Hydro Electric Commission agreed to erect a power line over Highway 6 on the north side of the town.

Clerk Art Roth told council that formal notice has been given regarding the intention to install water and sewer services in the west section of the village, subject to the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board. He also said that to date there has been one objection to the manner in

which the money is to be raised.

Clerk Roth said that tenders have been invited for carrying out modifications at the sewage treatment plant.

He also reported that the regional assessment commissioner had appealed a decision on a business assessment made by the County Judge for the reason that the business assessment was reduced to 30 per cent under a certain section of the assessment act, and that the business assessment should have read 75 per cent under another section of the act.

Council decided it would agree with a proposal from

Some examples of the changes are:

7,000 pounds gross weight reduced from \$44 to \$37; 7,000 pounds from \$52 to \$39; 8,000 pounds from \$61 to \$41; 10,000 pounds from \$78 to \$46; 12,000 pounds from \$95 to \$50; 20,000 pounds from \$195 to \$75; and 28,000 pounds from \$295 to \$100.

SELKIRK — The Walpole Township Citizens Action Association will host a meeting, on Wednesday Oct. 13, at 8 p.m. in the Selkirk Community Hall.

The three provincial candidates for Haldimand-Norfolk will be meeting together for the first time in Haldimand County.

The meeting between Conservative incumbent James N. Allan of Dunnville, Liberal candidate Alfred Judd of Simcoe and N.D.P. nominee Thomas

Tobey of Caledonia, was arranged on behalf of the WTCAA by association president Howard Nicklin.

This meeting will be public and the three candidates will be given the opportunity to explain their platforms and answer questions from the floor.

"We feel this will enable area citizens to become better acquainted with the proposals of the declared candidates in the forthcoming provincial election," says the association.

Officials Make Final Preparations For Match

Preparations are in the final stages this week for the Tuesday opening of the 1971 International Plowing Match. Ontario Plowmen's Association officials are on the site directing the bustle of activity around the tented city.

O.P.A. assistant secretary-manager, Art Peppin told the Record, a record number of exhibitors

have rented lots in the tented city this year and the local match committee are hopeful that the attendance will set a new record for the International.

For the first time in Canada, a tractor pull is being held at the International Plowing Match under sponsorship of the local county committee.

It is being held on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday afternoons under supervision of National Tractor-Pullers Association. One class will be pulled each day — 9000 stock, 12000 stock and 12000 open. On Thursday, and Friday a class for Canadians only is being pulled.

The Canadian Championship will be decided on Friday and a championship for each class will be declared each day.

This sport is very popular in the United States and Ed Hart, of Upper Sandusky, Ohio, president of the N.T.P.A. is very hopeful that a good number of tractors will be coming to Nanticoke to compete in this event.

The pull is held on a special dirt track and the tractors pull a type of "sled" which is being imported for the event.

The local committee are promoting interest for the Canadian class. Anyone interested should contact Drew Williamson of Doughty and Williamson, Jarvis; Lyle Heaslip of W. J. Heaslip Farm Supplies, Nelles Corners or Gordon Miller, R.R. 1, Jarvis.

All pulls will be held under N.T.P.A. rules and entries may be made day of the pull. There are trophies and cash prizes for the winners.
