business, he must be a useful citizen.

Mr. Kee retired from active community life in January this year when he had to give up his post as village clerk because of a heart attack he suffered in December.

Mr. Kee came to Cayuga in May 1941 as funeral director and furniture dealer.

He became president of the Boys' Band that fall, and when the band ceased operation, he retained the fund that became the nucleus for the Cayuga Trumpet Band in 1951.

One of Mr. Kee's most proud endeavours is his continuing membership and now chairmanship of the cemetery board. He first became a member of the cemetery board in 1945. Mr. Kee recalled the cemetery at that time was in a run down condition. It was at his suggestion the board put a roadway in the cemetery, established the boundaries and placed six brick pillars at the front of the cemetery and generally beautified it.

"We now have a lovely south end, the gulley at the north end has been land filled and will be seeded this year. The cemetery will be good for another half a century."

It was Sept. 1, 1958, that Mr. Kee became Clerk of Cayuga and during the past 14 years a number of changes have occurred in the village.

The new municipal building and fire hall were established and the first addition to the public school was made, with Mr. Kee looking after the issuing of debentures in both cases.

Then there was the "huge amount of work" involved with the Ontario Water Resources Commission system for the village.

The charges of sewerage rates and the development of certain areas in the south part of the village bothers him. The area that concerns Mr. Kee is near his residence, at the corner of Munsee and Joseph Sts. The present sewer lines end at the corner, but is to be extended this spring along Joseph St. to Thornburn St., south of the public school, which receives its sewer service on Munsee St.

Mr. Kee said that originally the OWRC approved the sewers only to Munsee and Joseph and that any further extension would have to be paid for by developers of land south of Joseph St.

Now, Mr. Kee says, the municipality is going to be required to pay for the extension

This will mean the householders will be paying \$13.30 every two months for sewerage charges, instead of about \$12.60.

It is in this one area that Mr. Kee finds his enthusiasm waning, in fact, he calls it, in his opinion the "greatest hoax perpetrated on the residents of Cayuga."

Mr. Kee contends that a member of Cayuga council, whom he chose not to name, is a member of the development group who owns land south of the school along the road where the sewers are to be extended. During debate on the issue in council, Mr. Kee said the member declared himself only once, and that was during debate on the bylaw to have the land rezoned.

However, Mr. Kee says the member then went on to participate in the debate.

Under the Municipal Act, a member of council is not allowed to participate in a debate involving an area in which he has an interest.

Mr. Kee's wife has also played an active part in Cayuga. She was a Sunday School teacher and a member

of the Auxiliary to the Scouts, working for a number of years especially to promote camping trips.

Mr. Kee also spearheaded the paving of Thornburn St.

As he recalls, when the new public school was built it was decided that Munsee St. would be paved. In 1967 there was a plan to have Highway 3 bypass Cayuga, but this would have split up a number of farms and following the election that year, that plan seemed to get set aside, Mr. Kee said.

He then suggested developing Thornburn Road rather than Munsee. He said county council found that it would be cheaper to build a new road than rebuild Munsee St. and so this was done. This had the effect of opening up an area of the village for development.

On The Farm Front

CAYUGA - An analysis of 1971 dairy herd account records for 55 dairymen in the Niagara area shows some differences between those with the highest net incomes when compared with the group average. Those with a larger net income had slightly fewer cows, 37 compared with 41 but they sold an average of 2,000 pounds of milk more per cow at 13,000 pounds compared with 11,000. The more prosperous dairymen farmed about 25 acres less (168 acres) than the average of the group. Milk sales per cow were \$100 more and the value of livestock produced amounted to an extra \$100 per cow for the top income group.

The group of dairymen with the most net income had a larger bill of expense particularly

with extra feed and other dairy expenses. Their total costs per cow were \$631 but the extragross dairy income of \$1,053 per cow left them a net of \$422 compared with the average dairyman's \$254 net per cow. All costs including interest on investment were considered.

The 55 dairymen who kept these Canfarm records of had their

accounts analysed would likely be more successful than their counterparts who did not keep records for analysis. A small number of Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association members took part in the 1971 Crop Cost Studies. This group met recently to discuss the results. Perhaps the important result for others to know and understand is that costs and profit vary considerably. The greatest difficulty co-operators have is placing a value on land that is owned. At today's land prices and interest rates a yearly cost for land can easily be calculated at 15 or 20 dollars per acre. Even without land costs, the cost of production varied from a considerable profit per acre to losses in some cases. Yield did not always determine the profit level.

The detailed results are available only to those who took part. Further studies will be conducted for 1972 crops. The Crop Cost Study committee chairman Jim Louks, R.R. 2 Cayuga, invites the participation of more members in the project.
