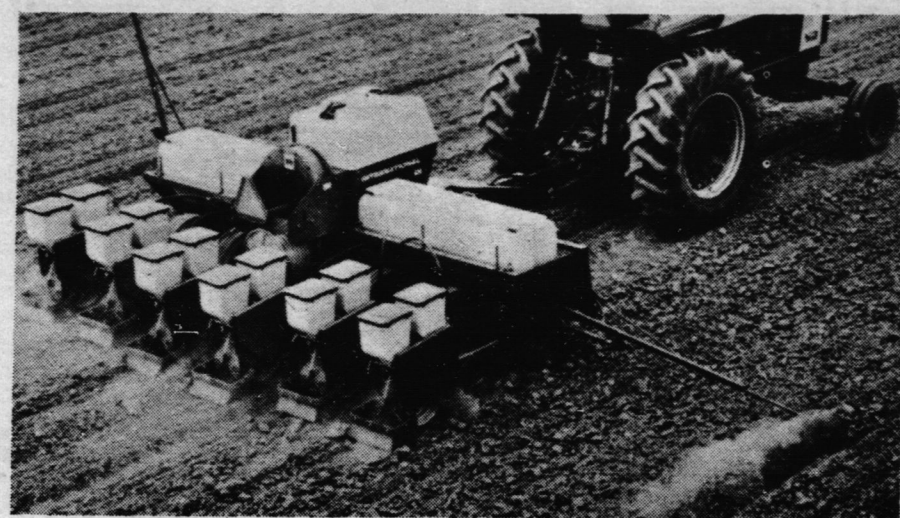

## Hagersville Police Report

The Hagersville Police department investigated five motor vehicle accidents and two non-reportable motor vehicle accidents, involving property damage only during March.

There were 12 charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act, three charges under the Liquor Control Act, three charges under the Criminal Code of

Canada, one charge under other Provincial Statutes and 13 charges under the parking by-law.

The members of the department investigated 130 general occurrences, arrested two persons for other forces and investigated six occurrences for other police departments.

There was one house-breakin with no loss, one shop-breakin with theft under \$50 and four thefts over \$50.

The members travelled a total of 2,604 miles, patrolling in the cruiser.
