## Fire Chief's Car Stolen

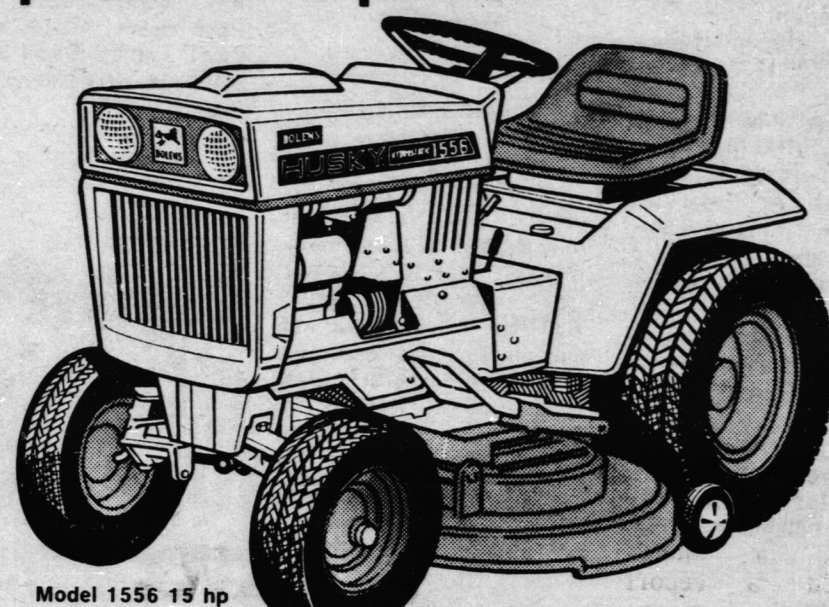

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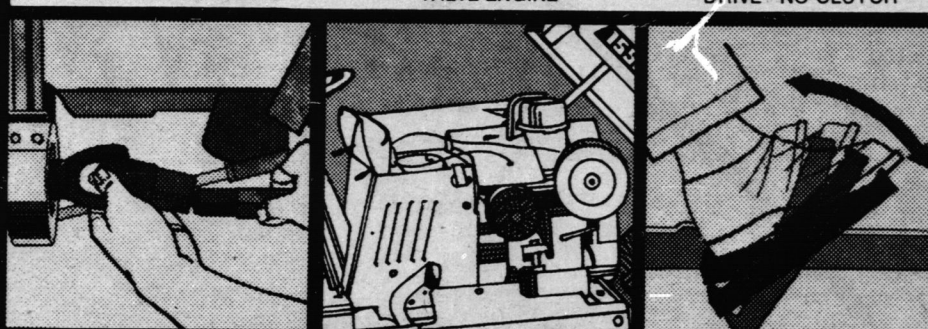

Last years total receipts during the April Campaign were the highest ever received by the Hagersville and District Branch, when a total of \$2,250 was received by volunteer canvassers. It is hoped the 1972 canvass will surpass that figure and reach the \$2,500 objective.
