## Board Hikes Insurance Policies By 6 Per Cent

The budget - finance committee of the Haldimand Board of Education reported they had reviewed the insurance policies of the board and recommended that buildings and contents coverage be increased by approximately six per cent to bring them in line for current values. The 1972 annual premium will be approximately \$22,000.

The management committee reported arrangements had been made to provide education in Hamilton for a student requiring special services. This committee also reported with regret, that one of the teachers at the Caledonia High School had passed away suddenly during the winter break on March 18. Arrangements have been made with a teacher to fill in the position. The committee also recommended the acceptance of resignation received from six teachers, four secondary and two elementary. Three teachers were promoted to headships in the secondary schools.

Kent Tuttle becomes head of English at Dunnville Secondary School, Don Hart becomes head of History at Dunnville Secondary School and Brian Whitman becomes head of English at Hagersville Secondary School.

The committee also pointed out a special ad hoc committee has been appointed which is meeting to undertake a review of all positions of responsibility within the secondary panel. Kindergarten registrations will take place on May 1 to May 5. The board was again reminded that registrations are lower than in previous years and consequently some re-arranging of classed will be necessary.

The committee also reported that a Picasso Art Exhibition of approximately 60 reproductions from the Art Gallery of Ontario will be on display at the Dunnville Secondary School from May 6 to May 13. The public is invited to view this display during the day-time hours. The display will also be open for viewing on Wednesday evening. The committee further reminded the board that songfests were being held at Dunnville Senior School on April 14; Cayuga Secondary School, May 3 and Hagersville Secondary School, May 12. These are songfests prepared by the elementary schools in the three areas.

The policy committee reported it had reviewed an accommodation report at its last meeting. The report took a

long range view of what possibilities existed in each of the elementary schools. It is recognized that if in the immediate future smaller enrolments will come to the schools, it may be possible to use some of the classrooms in other ways, such as library resource centres, kindergarten rooms where they do not exist, etc.

However, the board does not expect as great a decline in its elementary schools as will be the case in other areas of the province, due to the developments in the western end of the county.

The policy committee also reported that with developments expected in the Jarvis area, it would be necessary to consider a new school in that area.

The board has begun to investigate the possibility of sharing facilities with other community projects. It is noted that in some school jurisdictions, libraries and swimming pools are teamed up with schools to provide a fuller service to the community at one place.

Such a program is in the distant future but needs examination. The committee recommended that a committee be set up to review such situations.

The property committee reported the Anna Melick Public School addition is almost complete and will certainly be in readiness for school opening in the fall. The winter works painting program which is being provided through the auspices of

the Provincial and Federal Governments is proceeding on schedule. Painting has been carried on at Fairview, J. L. Mitchener and the Dunnville Secondary School. Painters are presently working at the Anna Melick Public School.

The property committee also recommended that improvements to the site addition at the Jarvis School be undertaken. Consideration is also being given to tree-planting at the new secondary school site in Ca'edonia.
