

## Norman Borlaug Story Shown To OIA Members

HAMILTON - Youth, Science and Agriculture was the theme of the April meeting of the Ontario Institute of Agrologists, Hamilton Branch held April 17.

Young people interested in Agriculture and Science were guests of OIA members to see a film called, Norman Borlaug: Revolutionary, and to take part in the discussion which followed.

Norman Borlaug, winner of the 1970 Nobel Peace Prize, was the first agriculturist to win the Nobel Peace Prize. He is best known for his wheat breeding work which set about the Green Revolution resulting in many of the world's poorer nations becoming self-sufficient in wheat production.

Discussion which followed the Norman Borlaug story centered around the need to control the birth rate in humans, achievements

in agriculture technology to feed the world's hungry, career opportunity in agriculture and the need to improve the agriculture image in the eyes of the general public.

"So far, we've proved him wrong," said Mr. Slote.

The village is currently awaiting the OWRC to take over the operation of the sewage plant and as Coun. Norman Crawford said, "when they are looking after it, they'll say how much it can handle."

Council decided it would pass on the letter from Mr. Pearce to their engineering consultants and to James Allan, MPP Haldimand-Norfolk.

In other business, council decided it could not renew a building permit to Gerry Wannop for the development of property at 85 Main St. N. Council earlier this year had cancelled the

building permit, claiming no work had been done at the property during the six month term of the permit. Mr. Wannop appeared before council after the decision was made, protesting the move. Council told Mr. Wannop that development of the property could not be undertaken because the sewage plant was limited in its capacity and that council had been warned not to permit any further large residential development in the village.

Mr. Wannop claimed work was done on the property during the six months and that the building permit should not have been cancelled.

Council approved a building permit for R. F. Almas to construct an eight-unit townhouse at the site of the old high school.

### Hospital Names

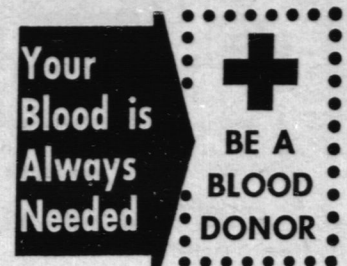
#### New Administrator

### ANNUAL FINANCIAL STATEMENT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1971

The Ratepayers of the Village of Jarvis, Haldimand County.

We have examined the records of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis, the Hydro-Electric System, the Water and Sewage System, and the Community Centre Board for the year ended December 31, 1971 and have prepared the following statements:

Statement 1 - Revenue Fund and Capital Fund Balance Sheet  
Statement 2 - Statement of Revenue and Expenditure

The year's operations resulted in a surplus tax of \$7,625.61. This surplus for the year together with the balance of surplus at the beginning of the year of \$22,630.29 amounts to an accumulated surplus at December 31, 1971 of \$30,255.90.

Taxes in arrears at December 31, 1971 amount to \$13,862.21, an increase of \$2,413.60 from the same time last year. Collections of 1971 taxes amounted to 89.64% of the roll.

We report that in our opinion:

(1) The financial transactions which have come under our notice have been within the powers of the municipality.

(2) The audit has been conducted in accordance with the instructions of the Department of Municipal Affairs.

(3) The financial statements present fairly the financial position of the municipality as at December 31, 1971 and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date.

## Watkins Claims PM Doing Nothing To Halt U.S. Takeover

SIMCOE - The Trudeau government has done absolutely nothing to prevent the U.S. take over of the Canadian economy, according to Prof. Melville Watkins, author of the Royal Commission Report on Foreign Ownership in Canada. Dr. Watkins was addressing a meeting of the Norfolk - Haldimand N.D.P. in Simcoe, April 17.

Watkins, an economic professor and N.D.P. candidate for Toronto Parkdale in the next federal election, stated that 95 per cent of all money spent in Canada by American firms is financed by Canadians themselves. Dr. Watkins used statistics from an Ontario Government study on foreign ownership.

High unemployment in Canada has become critical because multinational corporations are deliberately cutting back Canadian operations in response to President Nixon's policy to create jobs in the U.S., he said.

Watkins said the major issue in the next election should be the survival of Canada as a nation. He insisted that only the N.D.P. had a consistent nationalist policy. "The Tories will pay lip-service to Canadian independence, but Bob Stanfield is soft on American corporations," said Watkins. In addition, the Committee for an Independent Canada was supporting the Liberals.

On Nixon's visit to Canada he said, "It is a sorry state of affairs when the U.S. President has to come to Canada to tell us he wants to be independent."

Watkins insisted that N.D.P. policy on foreign ownership was a bare minimum, essential to Canada's

survival. These include a government screening agency on foreign corporations, no continental energy policy, protection of the Canadian automotive industry and full public ownership of banks and energy resources.

Watkins said Canadian banks were mainly responsible for financing the American takeover of Canada.

Four local N.D.P.'ers announced that they

would seek the New Democratic nominations in Norfolk-Haldimand. They are: Chester Faulkner, an Ancaster High School teacher from Caledonia; Maurice Payne, an employee of Ontario Hydro at Nanticoke; Ed Pos, an employee of American Can (Simcoe) of Windham Township; and Tom Tobey, who ran on the N.D.P. ticket in the last Provincial Election.



### REPORT

CAYUGA - On Sunday, April 16, a car stolen from Hamilton, was found abandoned on the Lakeshore Road, Walpole Township. A cottage near where the car was located had been broken into, another vehicle was stolen and recovered in Toronto. Later in the week, a 95-year-old Hamilton man was beaten and robbed in that city resulting in the arrest of two escapees from the Burtch Industrial Farm near Brantford.

Charges of break and enter of a cottage and theft of a vehicle were laid against the two subjects by Cayuga O.P.P. with all charges to be heard in Hamilton.

A vehicle stolen from a residence in Oneida Township was recovered in Tuscarora Township partially stripped and burnt out.

Three other break and enters were investigated as were two occurrences of theft.

Four violations of impaired driving were laid and one violation under the Liquor Control Act.

Twenty-four requests for assistance were answered along with 13 motor vehicle collisions investigated resulting in injuries sustained to four persons.
