

Erie Shoreline Protection Urged By McKeough

Heavy industrial development along Lake Erie's shores must be carefully controlled in order to preserve the shoreline for recreational use, the Lake Erie Development Council was told last week by provincial treasurer Darcy McKeough.

Mr. McKeough, in London to address the LEDC membership composed of the four counties of Oxford, Elgin, Norfolk and Middlesex, said the government is concerned that the uncontrolled, but orderly, growth of the past 50 years could become disorderly. He said the growth of heavy industry into the shoreline communities could unbalance the current development in the four counties.

The 24 page booklet on the subject is an analysis of the issues and offers three possibilities for development.

Projected population to the year 2000 sees an increase from 480,000 to 720,000. However, this does not take into consideration the projected population of 200,000 to 300,000 expected to come with industrial development in the Norfolk and Haldimand area.

Ford Motor Co. of Canada Ltd., now operates an assembly plant near St. Thomas and the Dominion Foundries and Steel Ltd. plans a major operation near Port Burwell in the 1980s.

At Nanticoke, Ontario Hydro is building its newest generating station, and major projects are scheduled by the Steel Company of Canada Ltd. and Texaco Canada Ltd.

Mr. McKeough said the main danger in the new development is that farmland and recreation areas along the Lake Erie shore will be lost as it becomes an industrial development corridor.

Mr. McKeough said industries should be encouraged to provide open space recreational areas between their plants and the shoreline.

"Ample public access to Lake Erie should be made available by restricting industrial access to the lakeshore to narrow service corridors."

The government seems to favor adapting present development trends "if just enough steps are taken to reduce the conflicts that lie ahead and accommodate the growth that will occur."

The second alternative is to concentrate urban growth and new industry and leave the region dominated by two major centres, London and the Simcoe - Nanticoke district.

The third approach is to decentralize development and spread it among all the towns and cities in the region.

While this might sound to be the fairest to each community it asks will the result be a "whole conglomerate of middle-sized towns, each with its own second-rate hotel, a cafe that can't afford a good chef, a movie theatre that can't get first-run films and a handful of small industries that will perhaps never grow enough to make their towns really prosperous?"

Mr. McKeough noted that each alternative has both advantages and drawbacks.

"There are no absolutes, no magic answers - no reasonable sounding schemes that are entirely right or entirely wrong."

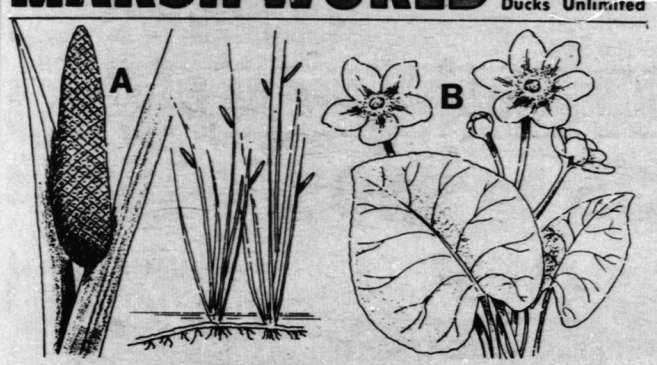

MARSH PLANTS

A - Sweet Flag; Calamus (Acorus calamus). A member of the Arum family, this tall, slender plant grows in the wet edges of marshes, ponds and swamps. The leaves are long, narrow and sword-like. The flowers are borne in a tapering spadix light yellow-green in color, rootstock creeping.

B - Marsh Marigold; Cowslip (Caltha palustris). Buttercup family, a low compact plant, leaves broad and heart-shaped, stems thick and hollow. Flowers deep yellow of 5 to 9 petals (actually sepals). Found in marshes, ponds and wet roadside ditches.
