A - Sweet Flag; Calamus (Acorus calamus). A member of the Arum family, this tall, slender plant grows in the wet edges of marshes, ponds and swamps. The leaves are long, narrow and sword-like. The flowers are borne in a tapering spadix light yellow-green in color, rootstock

B – Marsh Marigold; Cowslip (Caltha palustris). Buttercup family, a low compact plant, leaves broad and heart-shaped, stems thick and hollow. Flowers deep yellow of 5 to 9 'petals' (actually sepals). Found in marshes, ponds and wet roadside ditches.


