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ersville can grow."

Mr. Grove said his statement applied to the present, not to the future growth of Hagersville.

"The village is restricted to its growth at the moment because of the limited capacity of the sewage plant."

The village has applied to the OWRC to take over operation of its sewage treatment plant and Mr. Grove explained that normally this results in a delay of development proposals until the situation at the plant can be fully explored by the OWRC.

"Hagersville is in a prime position to grow and it is an attractive village. Eventually, without question, it will receive piped service to a regional sewage plant and receive piped water from Lake Erie."

"No one can put a top limit on Hagersville's ultimate size. But I would hope Hagersville will take a look at its own way of living and make a reasonable determination of its ultimate size. I would think it would like to retain its character of community. This cannot be measured in strictly dollars and cents. It is measured in the enjoyment of living."

"But this again hinges on the sewage treatment plant. It is the province's role in preventing pollution, exercising its responsibility under the various anti-pollution acts."

"Even though this is hard on Hagersville, its just as hard on Waterford or Simcoe when they are told they can't develop either."

"Simcoe has voluntarily found one of the problems holding the town back. They discovered a massive leak in the sewage system under the Lynn River. If this is curbed, then the sewage treatment plant will be able to handle another 1,000 dwellings. Simcoe is now looking at this problem and working closely with the OWRC."

Hagersville's comments about Mr. Grove's statement were prompted following a letter council received from Charles Pearce, county building safety inspector, who stated the sewage plant in Hager-

sville might be able to increase its capacity four times if ground water from the quarries were eliminated from the Harrop drain, which also drains the sewage plant effluent.

Mr. Grove said the contents of the letter should be carefully examined by the OWRC and if the contention is found valid, then "the sooner Hagersville will know where it's going."

Mr. Capewell said Union Gas is prepared to meet each gas customer individually in the areas affected by the proposed discontinuance and to make individual settlements.

He said if customers flatly refuse the individual settlements, then "we must approach the energy board with our proposal."

"We could have gone to the energy board before, but we chose this way. Anything that can be done on an individual basis is preferable to what a government department will do."

Mr. Capewell said the company would continue to expand the distribution system as required and "as long as economic conditions exist."

The company representatives were also questioned by a group of petitioners, the Walpole Township Citizens Action Committee, which claims a membership of 506.

The representatives were asked if the lines could not be updated on a type of local improvement. Mr. Capewell said the company could not charge a different rate in a specific area. "And if we could the rates would be so out of line no one could want it."

Council received five more petitions at its meeting objecting to the gas company's proposal. Two were from Walpole and the others were from Seneca, Rainham and North Cayuga townships. The total petitioners against the proposal now stands at about 1,000.

The membership at the meeting moved to set up a nominating committee after an unsuccessful attempt to persuade Mr. Craddock to back down on his decision to leave the executive position.

A new executive was elected by acclamation to fill the positions on the federal association. Jim Gibson will head up the group for the second consecutive year with Don Daley, first vice-president, Doug Sheppard, second vice-

president, Gordon North, third vice-president, Don Sewell was elected secretary and Dave Reid, treasurer. Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau was returned as honorary president of the association.

Commenting on election campaigns in Canada, Bruce Howard, MP for Okanagan, British Columbia, guest speaker, said "there is no such thing as a safe riding."

He warned that no riding should be considered "a sure thing" and he urged the group to organize themselves for an upcoming federal election, although he declined to speculate on a election date.

"Prime Minister Trudeau has said he will go to the people when his programs are completed and apparently that time hasn't arrived as yet."

Reviewing the programs of the Liberal

administration in Ottawa, Mr. Howard said the government is being severely criticised for attempting to accomplish a whole lot in a short time.

"It is difficult for the people to accept that we are trying to solve a number of problems in a short period and it takes some time to get used to the idea," he said.

Outlining the progress of the current government, the MP cited changes in language opportunities, tax reforms and cultural policies as examples of the efforts of the government.

He referred to the tax reform laws instituted late last year as being "greeted with genuine enthusiasm from all sectors of all population."

He added that "should Stanfield become the prime minister he wouldn't change one word of that legislation."

Indian affairs and agricultural programs have also been tackled by the government, according to Mr. Howard and "although we will be a long time before all the problems are all cleared up and the Indian people have equal opportunities, they recognize that there have been significant improvements."

Mr. Howard told the membership, "there is no real choice during the next federal election. It is either Trudeau or bumbling Bob."

"Stanfield has never been able to rule his own party. The western

Tories still think Mr. Diefenbaker is the leader and so does Mr. Diefenbaker," he quipped.

Defending the government's economic policies, the MP said Canada has the best inflation record in the western world. According to comparisons he made public, the Dominion's upward inflationary trend in 1971 was only 3.4 per cent compared with over 10 per cent in many European countries. He added that the job rate of growth in Canada is twice that of the U.S. and six times the rate of increase in Europe.

A "vigorous post-war population growth" was

blamed by Mr. Howard for the current unemployment situation facing the government. "To date we have the best track record in the world for beating inflation and increasing employment," he declared.

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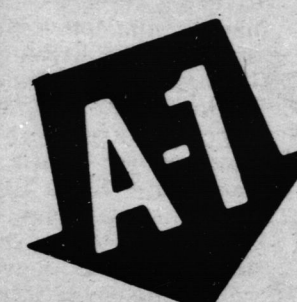
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
