

## Cottage Owners To Voice Opinion On Bylaw

Cottage owners in Walpole Township will have their opportunity to voice an opinion on the wording of a provincial government-enforced bylaw that limits the use of cottages in resort areas.

Walpole Council agreed Friday night at its regular meeting to hold a session Aug. 25 in the Nanticoke Hall, to discuss a change of wording in the bylaw. The Ontario government has requested hearings on

the change from "summer residential" to "resort residential" zoning.

At the urging of representatives from the Walpole Citizens Action Association, comprised mainly of cottage-owners along the lakefront, council decided to schedule the meeting for the weekend to give more cottagers a chance to attend.

The proposed change in the bylaw wording

is aimed at permitting use of cottages during the year, other than the currently allowed May to October season.

WTCAA supporters at the meeting expressed criticism of the bylaw, which allegedly will force some year-round residents near the lakefront to vacate their premises during the winter season on a permanent basis. According to regulations spelled out in the bylaw, only

cottages and homes in the summer residential zone area that were inhabited prior to 1967 are permitted to reside permanently.

Council stressed that the Aug. 25 meeting has been called to discuss wording of the bylaw and not the bylaw itself. The province has requested the meetings on the wording before it can be presented to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval.

Building permits for the township totalled more than \$130,000 for the year to the end of July.

Council gave two readings to a bylaw that would allow them to obtain credit for drainage works projects within the township. Members gave approval to the bylaw that would allow up to \$50,000 to be utilized in drainage construction.

One of the township dumptrucks will be retired from active duty, once council decides on a replacement for the vehicle. Councillors supported a move to call tenders for a new five-ton truck.

Council was invited at last week's session to participate in a bus tour sponsored by the Grand River Conservation Authority to tour conservation parks in the region. The tour is scheduled for Aug. 19.

HAGERSVILLE (Staff) The fate of a 12-unit townhouse now rests with the recommendation to council by J. R. McMurray, engineer, of the Department of the Environment.

The 12-unit townhouse was a compromise solution watered down from 44 units arrived at following an hour and a half debate at a special meeting Tuesday.

Mr. McMurray's recommendation hinges on whether the "overloaded" sewage treatment plant in the village can withstand additional input.

The capacity of the plant was the central point around which the discussion centered at Tuesday's meeting.

A building permit for the construction of some 44 units at the proposed Menorca Gardens subdivision was let last year.

However, it was cancelled after six months, according to bylaw, since no physical work had been done on the property by the devel-

## 8,000 Attend Golden Horseshoe Society Events

CALEDONIA (Staff) - The Golden Horseshoe Antique Society capped a most successful weekend of events, despite the spotty rainfall, with crowds totalling near 8,000 persons.

The attendance tally was down slightly from other years when more than 10,000 attend the annual event, which features Golden Avenue with all its old time buildings and the in-

teresting steam displays.

One of the major new attractions this year was an 1880 steam locomotive, set up on a short track. The engine had originally been purchased to work at the Hollinger mines near Timmins and is still in near perfect running order.

The full weekend of events got off to a rousing start Friday

night at a dance in Cayuga. A total of 400 persons attended.

Saturday's attendance at the events in Caledonia was 3,000.

### Multiple Housing Delayed

Jarvis council members delayed approval of a multiple-housing development proposed for the village, at a meeting Tuesday night, after a discrepancy was discovered between the official village map and a map of the site, submitted by the developer.

Reeve William Austin suggested council withhold its approval of the application for construction of a 106-unit townhouse complex, pending clarification of the site plan.

According to the map received by council and prepared by a consulting firm, the developer owns a section of frontage on Highway 6, south of Highway 3. The site
