

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

#### **Editorial Comment:**

### The Importance of STPs

The importance of proper sewage treatment facilities is being hammered home in the Village of Hagersville and it would be expected other small municipalities are taking

At last Monday night's council meeting a letter from the department of the environment agreed to allow a developer to build a 12 unit apartment and no more on a site that originally proposed 44 units.

R. J. McMurray, engineer, with the department, at a meeting Aug. 8 told the developers that there could be no more development at the site until the capacity of the sewage treatment plant is increased.

And he was adamant on that point. In fact took almost two hours of discussion to get Mr. McMurray to budge on allowing even

As he explained it, the simple fact of the matter is that the sewage treatment plant is operating way over its designed capacity. Any more residential development in the village will overload the plant to such an extent that the plant will not be treating the sewage at all, which would be of some concern to those who are downstream on the Sandusk Creek.

It would appear that with the exception of "infilling" of existing lots fronting on existing sewer lines and with the west section of the village, which is expected to get sewer and water lines later this year, the residential development of Hagersville is about to come to a grinding halt.

According to department of environment reports, the present plant is limit as to how large it can expand, being now at its maximum

size. The department is now in charge of the plant and has apparently discovered some problems, that when corrected, will permit a greater amount of sewage to be treated. But not enough to permit large scale residential

Hagersville's only hope, it appears, lies in the direction of regional government, which might tie the village in with other small municipalities in a regional sewage treatment plant. Primary treatment could be done in the village and the effluent piped to a secondary treatment

But until then, Hagersville is going to have a mighty struggle with itself deciding on whether to stay at its present size, or go ahead and push for a regional sewage treatment centre under regional government. Either way its going
