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Editorial Comment:

Let Cool Heads Prevail

After last Friday night's emotional blowout at the Nanticoke Community Hall, it would be hoped that cooler heads will prevail in the continuing dispute between various cottage owners associations and the Township of Walpole council.

Last Friday's confrontation proved nothing more than that cottage owners along the lakefront are hopping mad over the township's proposed amendment to its zoning bylaw that would change the present definition of summer cottage to resort cottage.

Other than that, the meeting provided nothing in the way of a forum for discussion on what is a very important question, both in the minds of the cottagers and for council.

Reeve Gordon Miller, who was constantly harassed by some members of the audience, chose the only avenue open to him in such a confrontation and left. He did, however, continue the discussion outside the hall where he had at least a chance at cooler debate.

Council had circulated some 200 forms at the meeting for the cottagers to fill out, indicating whether they were for or against the bylaw amendment. A further 300 have been printed and circulated and the deadline for filing the form has been extended to September 27. This will allow the cottagers some time to think over the matter and make a considered decision.

Once the forms are in the hands of the council, a decision will then be made on the amendment and it will be sent to the Ontario Municipal Board.

The OMB, if objections are received, will then call a hearing at which time the matter can be fully aired.

However, emotionalism has no place in an OMB hearing and both sides will have to argue logically and legally over the amendment to the bylaw. It will be in this setting, not at an almost out of control mob scene, that a decision will be reached.

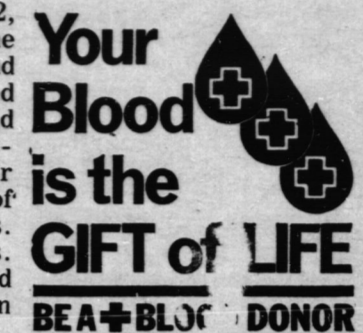
He was a former member of Local 736

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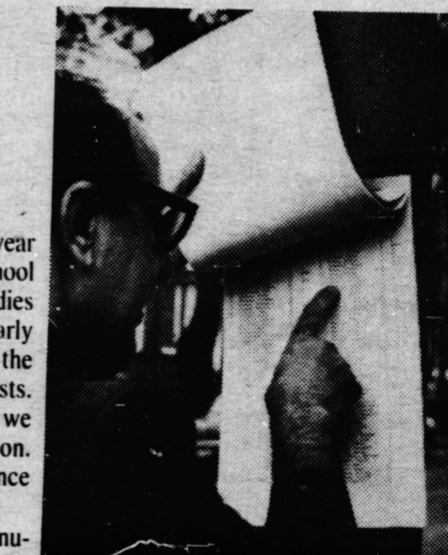
This is an election year for municipal councils, school boards and other local bodies in most of Ontario. An early step in these elections is the documenting of voters' lists. To assemble voters' lists we need to make an enumeration. This is done by the Province for each municipality.

But our municipal enumeration involves more than just voters' lists. It helps determine the division of education property taxes between the public and separate school systems. It lets the Province more fairly distribute grants to local governments to help reduce municipal tax bills. And it also helps provide us with an accurate population count.

Collecting nearly 8 million names and addresses, as you can imagine, is a big job. The

Province is employing 8,000 people to visit every residence in Ontario. When the government representative knocks on your door, the procedure is simple. The enumeration notice is pre-printed by computer with the names of everyone currently on record in your household. If you agree that the information is correct and complete, you simply sign the notice. If there are changes, such as an addition to the family, corrections are made on the spot, verified and signed by you or any other adult in your household. If you are not home the notice is left, together with simple instructions. You mail it, postage free, only if there are changes.

You will be counted sometime between September 5th and 18th.
