OPP Report

CAYUGA - On Dec. 2, Const. R. Porpealia investigated a break, enter and theft at St. John's Anglican Church, South Cayuga Township. Stolen from the church between Nov. 12 and Dec. 2 were two chandeliers, iron, gold in color, four arms protruding out with oil lamps extending down from each arm.

The chandeliers are approximately 3 1/2 feet high with 4 feet spread. The theft disrupts a set which is over 100 years old.

During the past week, two complaints were received from residents in Cayuga advising the theft of a number of Christmas tree bulbs that were stolen from trees decorated outside.

From one tree, the lights were striped from as high as seven feet.

The Ontario Provincial Police request residents to furnish them with any information as to the persons responsible.

During the Christmas season, thieves take an active part in removing presents and other articles from cars which are both locked and unlocked.

Most thefts occur when parcels are placed in the back seat of a vehicle in full view of the person with the intention of entering the vehicle either by the unlocked door or forcing a window, in most cases, the no draught window, and removing the articles therein.

for Tony Tratnjek. The turn out was 51 per cent.

At a candidates meeting in Jarvis for Walpole ratepayers last Thursday, the condition of roads, along with regional government and problems associated with the lakeshore were the major topics.

In Rainham Township there was an election for membership on the Haldimand County Board of Education. Incumbent Daniel Werner, of R.R. 1 Selkirk was defeated by R. Edward Empringham, of R.R. 1 Fisherville. Mr. Werner polled 167 votes to Mr. Empringham's 267.

A total of 436 votes were cast, representing only 15 per cent of the eligible voters. A total of 33 per cent of the resident voters cast their ballots.

lengthy history of library facilities stretching back to March 1894 when it was first organized as a Mechanics' Institute.

Its objective then was the "... establishment of a reading room and library for the circulation of the best standard books, publications and periodicals."

The library can now boast one of the most modern up to date facilities in the area and has a total of some 8,000 books on hand, which include several reference volumes.

During the first year of the "library" the provincial government gave a grant of \$148, which was augmented by \$1 per person annual membership.

In 1897 a free library was established, giving every Hagersville resident the right to its use at five cents for a membership card. In 1902, financial difficulties made it necessary to raise memberships within the town to 25 cents or 75 cents for a family.

Junior Champion of Canada, from Ottawa. Also featured will be the Junior Pair Champions of Canada, Watson - Frazer and Ron Shaver, the Western Section Champion of Ontario.

A shortage of funds plagued the library for many years, with the provincial grant alone point dropping to \$28. At one period the village council suggested the library might better be abandoned, but this was prevented by provincial statutes.

In April 1971 the Library Guild was formed and volunteers were found for a regular children's story hour. This was followed by organization of the first Art in the Park, held in conjunction with the Hagersville Kinsmen.

As interest in the library increased, the suggestion was made that the library needed larger and better quarters.

It was at this time that Gordon Davison, former manager of the Barry Manufacturing Company, arranged the gift of the glove factory to All Saints Anglican Church, for community use.

As their project in 1972, the Hagersville Lions Club adopted the challenge of renovating the building.

The Lions project to renovate the building has been under the chairmanship of Roger Makareth. Originally it had been estimated that the work could be done for \$25,000, but the project has now reached the \$35,000 mark.

Two hopefuls in the election, Brian George and Jim Anderson were defeated. Mr. George received 213 votes and Mr. Anderson, 130.

his post by acclamation on nomination day, Nov. 13.

A total of 265 people voted, representing 38 per cent of the potential vote in Jarvis. A total of four voted in the advance poll last Saturday.

For the Roman Catholic Separate School Board trustee, a total of 10 votes were cast for Gerald Snyder and one for Tony Tratnjek. In that contest Gerald Snyder won with 34 votes, defeating Tony Tratnjek with no votes.

Kincaid was returned by acclamation. Coun. Norman Crawford moved into the deputy-reeve's post when incumbent Ross Slat stepped down.

On council will be incumbent Robert Gedye and two new faces in the persons of Dominic Vanni and Fred Brock.

Hagersville did hold an election though, for the position of trustee on the Roman Catholic Separate School Board. In that contest Gerald Snyder won with 34 votes, defeating Tony Tratnjek with no votes.


