Good Milking Practices
For Top Production

Good milking practices establish a favorable routine making milking a pleasant experience for the cow. Besides the benefit of increased production, good milking practices are the best defence against mastitis, says J. H. Inglis, assistant agricultural representative for Grenville County.

Dairymen should understand their cattle and take advantage of the animals' hormone functions. Proper pre-milking stimulation is the first requirement of the milking operation; and production of high quality milk requires that the udders be cleaned and sanitized.

The cleaning process can accomplish both these requirements. Washing or massaging the udder releases a hormone called oxytocin which causes milk letdown.

Generally, cows in the early part of their lactations and higher producing animals require less stimulation before milking. The udder should be washed one or two minutes before the milking machine is attached.

If the interval between washing and milking becomes too long, production may drop and machine time will increase.

Individual quarter milking is also important. The rear quarters produce about 61 per cent and the front quarters 39 per cent of the total milk during the lactation.

Since the front quarters will usually milk out faster than the rear, dairymen should be ready to take the machine off those quarters that are milked out to avoid conditions which may result in mastitis.

Overmilking is one of the problems that occurs frequently on dairy farms. This happens most often when a dairyman operates too many units by himself. One man can effectively operate only two units in a milking barn and only three units in a milking parlor. Overmilking causes stress and irritation to the cows. They begin to expect pain and secrete adrenalin which prevents rapid milk letdown. Overmilking also tends to produce slow milkers. But if the operator changes his practices to encourage faster milking, even many hard-to-milk cows will gradually change their habits.

A sound mastitis detection and control program makes money for you in many ways. It can save on treatment costs, helps increase production per cow and extends the milking life of animals in the herd. Practicing a control program also enables a dairy operator to sell all his milk and produce a higher quality product.

Gentle treatment and calm surroundings permit successful completion of all the important steps of good milking practice.

Big Bernie, a four-foot-high stuffed canine who became attached to the minor hockey organization last year, will be sartorially elegant for the occasion. He will be attired in a snazzy double-knit suit, sweater in local hockey colors, helmet and boots to

match-all thanks to painstaking hours of fitting, sewing and handwork by Mrs. Margaret Hartman of Delhi.

Starting off from Simcoe Arena at 10.30 a.m., Big Bernie, Santa Claus and two mammoth, live St. Bernard dogs will lead a procession of 50 boys from four minor hockey teams through the downtown business section.

A rather pre-tournament event will take place in front of the arena at 7.30 p.m. Monday, Dec. 18, when the Olympic torch will be lit. The flame will burn continuously for the balance of the month until the tournament winds up on Dec. 31.

Simcoe Minor Hockey Association workers reported this week an excellent response by businesses and individuals to sponsorship of 160 trophies for members of winning teams in the Minor Olympics. The sale of booster buttons for admission to all regular tournament games, Dec. 26 to 30, is also progressing.

A total of 24 teams from Canada and the United States have entered the tournament, which will be run off over five days in four divisions--novice, pee-wee, bantam and midget. An extra attraction will be offered Dec. 31 when four all-star teams from the tournament will play divisional winners and a special game will be staged between Simcoe Junior Jets and Chicago Juniors.
