A dentistry office on the Six Nations Reservation at Ohsweken in the new Central School, has now been opened full time. Dr. Harvey Palmer, a 26-year-old graduate of the University of Toronto, has recently set up a mobile equipment unit, and has begun dental examinations of the school children.

Dr. Palmer has previously worked on reservations in the Sioux Lookout and Moose Factory areas, and is planning to visit the schools on the reserve to examine all the students' teeth. All examinations, extractions, and dental work will be done without cost to the parents. Dr. Palmer said another dentist will be coming to the reserve to handle adult examinations at the reserve's central health clinic.
