#### Legal Aid For Reserve

Recently the Six Nations Reserve elected council agreed to allow a pilot legal aid clinic to be set up on the reserve. Brant County legal-aid officer, Kenneth P. LeFebvre, said the project, which would operate on a once-a-week basis, is designed to make it easier for reserve residents to avail themselves of the services in the department.

Many of the reserve residents are elderly and find it most difficult to get into Brantford for the necessary interviews, he said. The anticipated project has to be approved by head office in Toronto, Mr. LeFebvre said, and he estimated perhaps 10 persons would use the clinic each week.

Legal aid, he said, gives advice on all legal matters, not just criminal ones, as well as processing applications for financial relief in obtaining lawyers.

#### Fire Call

Hagersville Volunteer Firemen responded to a call in early morning zero temperatures on Feb. 10. The call was received at 6:45 a.m., when a fire broke out in a back lean-to of a rented house on the farm of Donald Hunter, R.R.3, Hagersville.

Part of the upstairs of the house was gutted, with some damage done by both water and smoke. Fire Chief William McClarty was unable to assess damages at the time of the mishap.

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## Six Nations Council Angered By Car Thefts

Recently, Victor Porter, a Six Nations elected councillor, said he is sickened by the reputation the Indian Reservation is getting as a dumping ground for stolen cars.

He said more than 290 stolen cars were recovered by police on the reserve last year. Mr. Porter criticized the provincial courts of appeal for reducing sentences handed out to convicted car thieves by local judges.

More than 100 interested parents visited Parkview Public School, Feb. 1 and 2.

The idea of the visitation to the school, was to be able to observe the classes in progress. Parents found this opportunity most interesting and definitely worthwhile to see their children in the various phases of learning.
