This will be the team to beat in the playoffs for the town league championship later next month.

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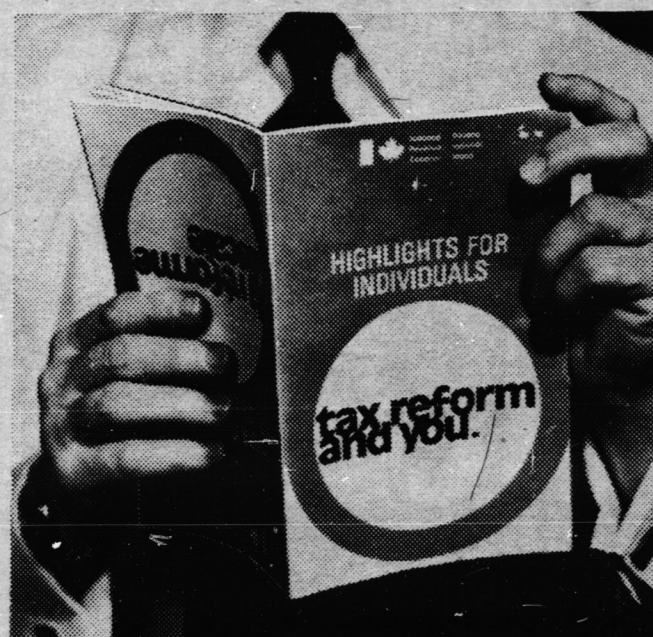
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Commercial League
