CAYUGA - A pork producer's workshop is to be held at Kohler on Wednesday, Feb. 23, from 10 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. Specialists Garnet Norrish, Ron Denniss and Dr. Peter Oliver, will be on the panel of speakers. Among the topics to be covered will be herd health, production and boar selection. Lunch will be arranged by the county pork producer's association for up to 40 participants.

Pork producers of Haldimand recently agreed that a proposed pork insurance program should be looked at further. Their resolution to the Ontario Pork Producers organization contained the reservation that they wanted another look at the final draft before any such program is started.

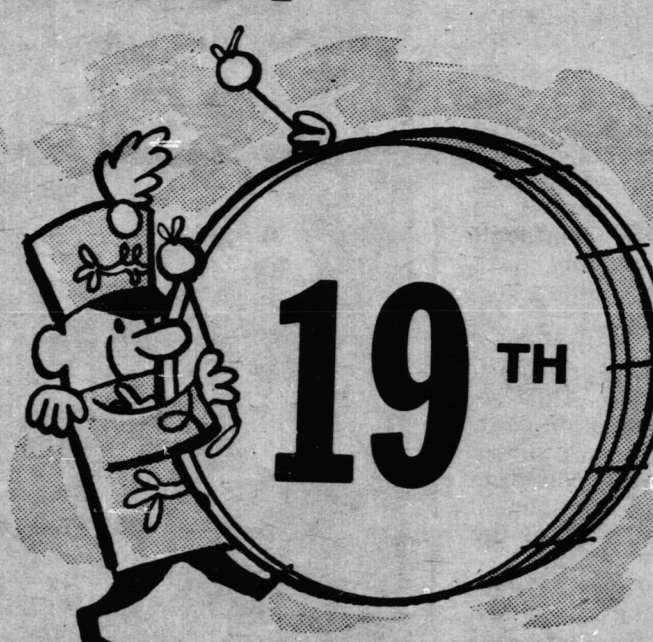
