Last Tuesday night's hockey action resulted in the great comeback victory of a Fisherville group of guys against a tough Jarvis crew; the Flyer loss to the Hawks in a protested game and the solid Garnet victory over the Smoothtown Bruins, league-leaders for the moment.

A see-saw battle in the opener saw the Bushwackers come back from a 4-2 deficit to defeat the Merchants of Jarvis 7-5. Floyd Marshall with two goals led the Fisherville attack and singles went to Jim Lyal, Paul Fulsom, Doug Winger, Jack Wardell and Greg Garmon. The Jarvis club spurted early then burned out in the third period. Jim Jacques had two goals for the losers as did big Jim Hazlett - one a slap shot that scored from his own end, taking a wicked hop past the Fisherville net-minder. Charley Montague netted the other Merchant tally.

In the Hawk-Flyer contest, played under protest by the Springvale club for the illegal use of an unsigned player and the use of Pat Lorimer who was believed to have been suspended for two games last week in the Hawk-Bruin contest, but used last Thursday night anyway. The game itself was hard-fought and the Hagersville team came out the scoring winners 3-2, as Pat Lorimer notched two markers and Denny "Whip" Wilson added a third score. For the Flyers, Doug Weaver tallied both times in the loss.

The protest was later upheld by the league executive in a hotly disputed meeting. In the evening's late game, the Garnet and Smoothtown power-houses clashed in a great battle and this time the Plowboys emerged the victors 4-1. A magnificent three goal performance by Fred McKeen led the Garnet

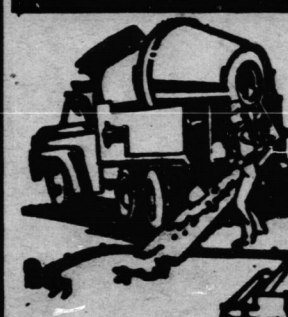
