Editorial Comment:

Valuation Day

At last some information on Valuation Day that is straight forward and uncomplicated has come our way courtesy of Montreal Trust.

Valuation Day has been of some concern and inderstanding by those whose understanding of financial matters is somewhat less than that of a chartered accountant.

As explained in the firm's newsletter, the principle of Valuation Day is "simple." Since Canada now has a capital gains taxation in its tax system, some kind of special provision is necessary to avoid taxing gains which took place before the introduction of the capital gains tax. To do otherwise would be to engage in retroactive

"In general," the firm states, "the new capital gains tax will be calculated on one-half of net capital gains realized in a taxation year. In determining taxable income, capital losses will be allowed as a deduction.

Capital gains tax is normally payable only when a gain is realized. In some circumstances the tax authorities may treat the taxpayer as if a capital gain had been realized. For example, when a person dies, leaves the country or makes a gift, the capital gains tax will be applied as if the property had been sold. No tax, however, would be payable on property gifted or passing on death to a husband or wife.

Generally, any asset now worth more than \$1,000 or may in the future be sold for more than \$1,000 will be subject to a capital gains tax.

One important exception is that a gain on the disposal of a taxpayer's principal residence will not be subject to tax. However, all other real estate, including summer cottages, will be subject to capital gains tax.

Farmers disposing of a farm including farm land may deduct from any capital gain an amount of \$1,000 for each year in which the farm was owned. If the farmhouse was his principal residence, he may treat it and appropriate surrounding property as such and pay only on the gain from the sale of the farmland itself.

The question is, should a taxpayer run out and find the nearest expert valuator for the class of assets concerned and obtain a valuation? It is clear the law does not require such valuations to be obtained and it is not part of the government's intention to create a field day for professionals qualified at certifying values.

The firm advises that taxpayers will not need to be 'galvanized into action by Valuation Day and perhaps be tied to an expression of value on that date which they may regret with hindsight, but rather to allow Valuation Day to become part of the revenue gathering lore with quiet equanimity and to deal with the tax collector when the time comes."

Safe Snowmobiling

snowmobiling, it is perhaps a good idea to keep in front some of the rules of safety regarding the use of snowmobiles.

Philip J. Farmer, executive director of the Canada Safety Council, writing in a booklet published as a guide for safe snowmobiling, noted that "like other mechanized vehicles, the importance of the safe use of the snowmobile has grown with its increasing numbers, design, sophistication and speed. But, no matter how well and how safely a snowmobile may be built, the machine is only as safe as the person operating it.

"Safe operation begins with knowledge of federal, provincial, county and municipal snowmobile laws and regualtions. The snowmobiler should know and observe the regulations for the areas in which he is using his snowmobile

"Safe operation involves knowing your machine, how it operates, how to maintain it, how to ride it safely under any condition.

"Safe operation requires knowing your limitations on the snowmobile, riding within your capabilities and within the law, and using courtesy and good judgment. More and more, marked snowmobile trails are being developed throughout the snowbelt. Make use of them, obtain and obey the rules of the trails and you and all snowmobilers will gain more enjoyment.
