#### Wise. Unwise and Otherwise

The conflict between men of religion and men of science is nothing new. For our purposes we might say that it began with Copernicus (1473-1543) who declared that the earth moved around the sun in opposition to the popular belief that the sun moved around the earth. which was thought to be the centre of the universe.

It is quite obvious that the people who lived in Bible times had this view; there is the story of the sun standing still at Ajalon in Joshua's day. And there is plenty of other evidence. Thus the idea that it was the sun, not the earth, that was the centre of the universe aroused immediate opposition.

Galileo, who lived about a century later, and had the use of the telescope, confirmed the findings of Copernicus and was attacked in the same way. Today, everyone accepts the Copernicus theory; even those who insist on a literal interpretation of the Bible accept it.

Today, of course, things are very different, even the age we live in is called "The Scientific Age" and science has entered into every aspect of our lives, from the discovery of insulin to cure diabetics, to putting men on the moon. Let me also remind you that your automobile, your TV set and your electric toaster are all products of scientific research. The world in which we live is almost totally different from the

world that the Bible pictures. Does this mean that the Bible is out of date, a quaint survival of the past, with very little to give us in this present age? Evidently, there are many who vigorously deny this, saying that the Bible is a book for every age, and actually Bible sales all over the world are very high. To us who still cling to the Bible, who believe in God as the Creator and who see Him as active in the world today, the scientist, whatever they may discover, are still simply "thinking God's thoughts after Him."

Dr. Pollard, a top scientist of the U.S. has written a book: "Science and Faith, Twin Mysteries," which is a scientific book dealing with religion. The thesis is that the more one probes into the make up of matter, into the aeons of space and time, into the intricate infinitesimal complication of living things, the more mysterious it all becomes.

The more one discovers the mystery of the created world, the more one is driven to the ultimate mystery of God. The scientist can probe and investigate, but he cannot explain why or how.
