## 2 Main Groups Litter

Who litters? Public opinion surveys indicate that no one group — and certainly few individuals — are entirely free of littering habits. In general, there are two main classes of litterers — the casual litterers who can be weaned from his occasional lapses and the deliberate litterer who is not amenable to persuasion and must be deterred by other methods.

There are significant differences in the littering habits of different groups. \*Littering is related to age. The littering practices

of adults between the ages of 21 to 35 are more than three times greater than those of persons over 50, and nearly twice those in the age bracket of 35 to 49.

\*Men are much more guilty of littering than women. They have more opportunity to litter in going to and from work and in the greater time they spend out of doors.

\*The number of persons in a household is also related to littering. Homes with only one or two persons litter significantly less than those made up of five or more persons.

\*Residents of the smallest communities (those under 2,500) are more likely to litter than residents of the biggest cities.
