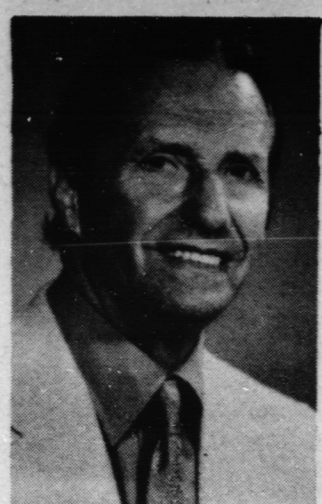

Filmed Interview Showing At Knox

Roy Bonisteel finds Rev. Eme very newsworthy, perhaps you will too.

In a 15-minute sound-color 16 mm film in interview, Roy Bonisteel, Star of CBC TV's program Man Alive, presents a person-to-person chat with this courageous and resourceful little man. It is the highlights of the extraordinary and terrible months of insurrection when his people, the Ibo's of Eastern Nigeria, were total refugees, running from all settled areas into the bush country, hiding by day, moving furtively by night.

Today, with economy, education, medical services coming back from almost total annihilation, what's the story. It's amazing from where a people with nothing can derive human re-

sources both of the spirit as well of the material.

You can see and hear this brief, quiet, modest story in a filmed question and answer interview Sunday, Feb. 6 at 10 a.m. in Knox, Jarvis, and at 11 a.m. in Chalmers' Stone Church.

Be on time. It's the brief open session before the regular church school classes. It's the story behind the news.

Editorial Comment:

The Stage Is Set

Haldimand County's new warden John McCombs has served notice that he expects a change of attitude among his colleagues on council regarding the implementation of regional government.

One of Warden McCombs first pronouncements following his election to the office was to tell council that the provincial government's policy is to implement regional government and that it was therefore up to every councillor to "prepare for our destiny."

This amounts to a rather abrupt about face for county council and one which Norfolk county council will probably view with interest.

Since the two county study was instituted back in 1969, Norfolk and Haldimand have been having a see-saw battle over the possible implementation of a regional form of government for the area, predicated on the forecast of great industrial growth in the area.

In 1970, Clayton O. Smith, Reeve of Seneca Township, was elected warden of Haldimand and it was evident throughout his tenure he was not in favor of regional government, as such, with Norfolk. However, he did favor a form of regional restructuring of the system in Haldimand, with liaison through a planner with Norfolk.

This was viewed as a step in the right direction, but by no means a solution. It did, however, appear to meet with general approval on Haldimand council.

Now, virtually within minutes of being elected Warden, Mr. McCombs appears to be changing the ground rules.

Behind this lies the fact that wardens in Haldimand are elected according to the provincial party system, with Liberals and Progressive Conservatives holding sway in council.

Warden McCombs election came as no surprise because he was chosen earlier by the Progressive Conservative caucus of county council. Haldimand is one of two remaining counties in Ontario that still elects its warden according to the party system - Liberals one year, Conservatives the next.

Within seconds of Warden McCombs pronouncement about regional government, he suggested the creation of the position of deputy warden, following suggestions made during the former year by Reeve Smith.

The decision seemed to smack of more backroom political dealing since only the barest amount of discussion was held and, voila, within 24 hours there was a new deputy warden, Reeve Mrs. Lorna Miller, of Dunnville, a Liberal.

Thus within two days the stage was set at county council for what Eric Grove, assistant director of the two-county study remarked will be a "most interesting year."

OPP Report

CAYUGA - Officers of this detachment investigated 14 motor vehicle collisions which resulted in injuries to four persons.

General occurrences investigated were: six thefts, two break and enters, 13 requests for assistance, two other Criminal Code offences and one Liquor Control Act investigation resulting in a charge being laid.

Jan. 24, 1952

The Ontario Milk Control Board announced yesterday a new minimum price for fluid milk in the Jarvis area. The price, which becomes effective Feb. 1, will give the producer an increase from \$3.90 to \$4.40 a hundred weight and the maximum retail price has been increased from 17 cents to 20 cents per quart.

The same prices were established in the Hagersville and Cayuga area. In Dunnville the retail prices advance from 19 cents to 21 cents per quart and the price to the producer advances to \$4.60 from \$4.12 1/2.

Norman C. Colbert was elected president of the Board of Trade at the annual meeting held last Friday night, Jan. 18 at the American Hotel. The meeting voted unanimously to accept the slate of officers for the coming year as presented by the chairman of the nominating committee, Arthur Blight. The other two important chairs will be occupied by S. J. Church, vice-president and by James Andrews as secretary treasurer.
