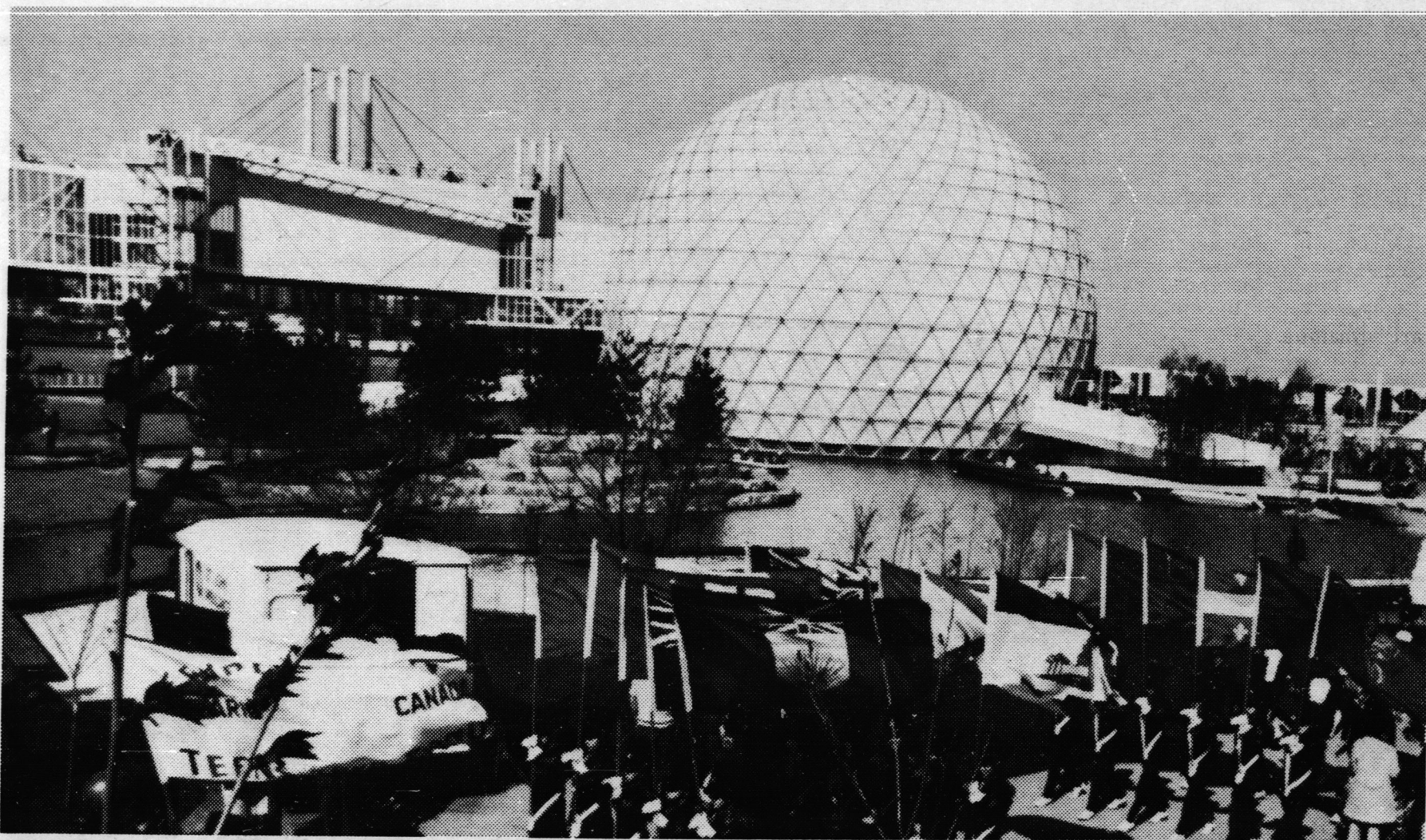

## On The Farm Front

**CAYUGA** - The 1,785 tons of agricultural limestone applied in Haldimand County during the year that ended March 31, 1972 was exceeded only by the tonnage applied in Niagara South, Kent, Essex, Elgin and Lambton Counties in Western Ontario. In Eastern Ontario more than 1,785 tons of agricultural limestone were applied in Frontenac, Prescott and Russell Counties. The amount of agricultural limestone applied in Kent County was more than 10 times the amount used in Haldimand.

A farm Machinery Board was recently established for the purpose of resolving problems encountered by farmers with farm machinery, its repair, maintenance, and use. Hal Wright, the Secretary-Manager of the Board, will be encouraging those who encounter difficulties with farm machinery repair, maintenance or use to advise him at his Guelph office.

**Agricultural Days** at the University of Guelph are scheduled for July 11 and 12, 18 and 19. On Tuesday, July 11, program features at the Arkell Research Station will be 'Waste Management' and at the Guelph Campus 'How Tax Changes affect the

farmer.' A special beef cattle seminar will be held on July 12. Visits July 18 and 19 will be at the Elora Research Station for tours of crops, soils and dairy research. Detailed programs are available at the county agriculture office.

Haldimand County's 4-H and Junior Farmer Judging Competition will be held on Saturday, July 8, at the Dry Lake Saddle Club Grounds, Decewsville. The program will begin at 9 a.m. and consist of judging various classes of livestock as well as participation in several exercises dealing with general agricultural topics.

This Judging Competition is open to all rural young people age 12-28 years, and it is hoped that as many as possible can attend this competition.

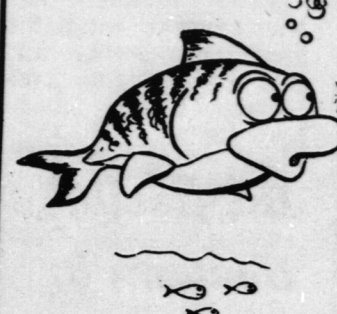
