This is especially valuable to the beginner or the player who desires to make the most progress in the least time; but it should always be intelligent practice. Every bowl in its route of travel should be watched carefully. If it remains tilted, wobbles excessively or runs abnormally, try and locate the cause, for correction in the following bowl.

If too wide or narrow change the point of aim. If approximate 'length' cannot be acquired in 15 minutes or so, quit for the day on this detail, no player should practice so

Practically every club has tricky greens; advanced players should not overlook the fact that intelligent practice on such greens, when available, will add to their skill at lawn bowls, for the game is seldom played on perfect surfaces.

Look down at your feet and see that they are pointing in the direction in which you want to go.

Check the bowl in your hand for correct bias.

See that the bowl is perfectly level in your hand.

Federation Facts

Should Ontario have a corn marketing plan? That is a question O.F.A. had been directed by corn growing counties to study.

After meetings of corn growers in the counties, a provincial meeting of corn growers was held in Toronto by O.F.A. early in June. About 60 county representatives attended that meeting and examined a working paper on a possible corn marketing plan which was prepared by concerned corn growers in Essex and Kent counties.

The meeting agreed that Ontario's corn industry needs regulation and that producers need a marketing agency. The meeting gave support to the principal of a marketing board with agency powers, consisting of farmers only.

This board would work in close co-operation with the corn council which was appointed by the Minister of Agriculture and Feed in the fall of 1971.

The corn growers also agreed O.F.A. should press for introduction of a corn marketing board with a vote of the producers after a trial period of at least two and a half years. Board of directors should be elected by and from corn growers marketing at least 2,000 bushels of corn to the trade in the previous two years.

The O.F.A. directors at their June 21 meeting, after studying the report of the corn meeting agreed that the recommendations of the corn meeting should be accepted as policy of the organization, and authorized their executive to confer with the government appointed corn council The Ontario Farm Products Marketing Board and the Minister of Agriculture on the formation of a corn marketing plan for grain corn in Ontario.

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
