

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#### **Editorial Comment:**

#### Importance Of Water

The importance in our daily lives of water cannot be emphasized too often or too greatly.
Our very existence and livelyhood depends on water and fortunately for all it is one of nature's few "renewable" resources. Run water through the dirtiest industrial application and, eventually, through evaporation, it will cleanse itself. However, like may of nature's methods, this is

too slow for man's impatient rush. Man, therefore, with his technical knowledge and abilities, is left in charge of renewing water himself or facing extinction.

For years, centuries, man did not care to acknowledge the importance of potable water and charged headlong into the industrial revolution leaving the water for nature to look after. Now, however, as industry continues to mushroom the water can no longer tolerate the heavy industrial and municipal usage.

Municipalities are beginning to realize the overwhelming importance of water. Without it they cannot expand and if a municipality cannot expand it remains stagnat.

Hagersville and Cayuga are two such municipalities facing this critical involvement with water. Hagersville has become notorius for its poor quality of water and very definitely needs a new clean water supply.

Cayuga, apparently, has ample supplies of potable water, but its supply system is charged with leakages, effectively limiting its ability to supply an increased demands.

The outflow after water has been used is also a critical factor in municipal growth. Again, without adequate treatment, there can be no growth. Both Hagersville and Cayuga are taking steps to have their treatment plants operated by the province in the hopes that provincial expertise can solve these problems and aid in the expansion of the municipalities.

Through aware municipal leadership these steps are being taken.

But the cost is high. However, this can be balanced against future growth and the welfare of each of the municipality's citizens.

It is only through leadership such as has been shown in these municipalities that the villages will be able to take their share and benefits from the anticipated growth as the region soon begins its shift from agricultural priorities to a more industrial oriented society.

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
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
